## The Market Basket

Within a few short weeks at the most strawberries will make their appearance in the Portland markets. Already the green fruit is appearing on the plants in some parts of California and it will not take long before shipments to this market will be made. According to the report from California, there is every probability at this time of a very liberal production. In this state growers have planted many additional acres to strawberries and unless weather conditions go astray prices are not likely to climb quite so high as they did a year ago. Last year strawberries were so high priced that few housewives put them away for the winter.

Mushrooms have again made their appearance in the local retail markets, but the supplies are so small at this time that prices are ranging over 50 cents a pound. A few days of alternate rain and sunshine will quickly bring down the price.

Meats climbed up several notches in the price during the past week. This was at wholesale, but owing to the fact that the big packing houses are fighting the smaller concerns the retail prices are practically unchanged. In some of these "trust busting" markets you can today buy meats several cents a pound under the price that retailers are expected to pay—in fact, you can buy fully a cent a pound under the price the killers pay on the hoof. Just now it looks as if the meat war will be continued for some time. Each side is very stubborn in its views and neither will allow the other a chance to make a profitable business if it can be helped. For this reason the war will go on until one side or the other is forced to give in. Then you may expect to pay interest on the money that the big packers lost during the fight. The fiddler is paid on all occasions by the public.

Those that put in good supplies of sugar while the price remained low are now congratulating themselves, for during the past few days there was a very sharp advance in the price of wholesale and in consequence that much was added to the retail figure. Higher cost of raw sugar in the east was the cause.

With the promised heavy production of fruits the coming season, there are not likely to be much lower prices in the sugar market. A year ago the fruit crop was light in every section of the country and this with the increased acreage in sugar gave the refiners about twice as much sugar as they had a demand for.

During the past few days some very fancy ears of bananas arrived here from Central America. While the bananas were rather green, they were otherwise in good shape and in a few days they will be in a ripe condition, ready for market. Until that time supplies of

There is not a meat market in the city that has Government inspection of meats—not one. There are some that "scream" for it, but it is only a fraudulent Beef Trust trick. Government inspection may be a very good thing for foreign and interstate trade, but it is hardly practicable in a city like Portland, where a large part of the meats come direct from the farm. And the fact that many of the Beef Trust markets make a "screech owl" out of Government inspection while at the same time they handle any kind of meat that comes their way is a disgrace to the Government and Government inspection.

Smith's is the only market in the city that does not handle those famous Beef Trust bulls. Meat of that sort is dear at any price. Do not eat it if they give it to you.

Good stock are scarce. Oranges and apples are selling very fast these days. Good apples are rather scarce and this is causing some addition to the price.

Most of the stores are selling fresh ranch eggs at 20 cents a dozen today owing to the further decline of the price at wholesale. While it may be possible it is not likely that eggs will go much cheaper than the present price, this being about the low point during the past few years.

So scarce have been the supplies of chickens in this market of late that most of the retailers have been forced to draw again on the east for supplies. One large retailer asserts that his monthly bills for eastern chickens amount to fully \$2,000, or about \$34,000 for one year. This is the purchase of but one dealer and shows to some extent the great amount of chickens consumed in a city like Portland. It is estimated that triple this amount is received by all the other dealers together, or \$72,000 worth of eastern chickens each year. This does not count the home supplies.
