OPENED TRUNKS DISCLOSE SLOT MACHINES AND BABY CLOTHES

In the bulging tills of trunks and cases were found some things that made wry faces.

Forty trunks, 20 boxes, 18 telescopic trunks and as many valises found new owners yesterday afternoon, who bought them and their contents without knowing what would be disclosed when the lids were opened and the straps undone. The collection constituted the "leave overs" which accumulate yearly in the baggage rooms of the railroads and terminal company and are auctioned off to satisfy the charges against the owners who for various reasons fail or neglect to claim their property.

Yesterday afternoon the year's collection was sold to the highest bidder at the Baker auction house, Park and Alder streets. Here the gambling instinct, which every human being possesses to a more or less degree, led against itself. A trunk, suit case was put up for sale and its real value to the bidder was represented not by the article itself, but by the value of its unknown contents.

Trunks and suit cases ranging from \$2.55 to \$18.50. None was permitted to be opened in the auction rooms, but in the rooms adjoining, where some of

them were taken, their contents were made known. Inside there were things that caused laughter, jokes, sorrow, regret and all the other feelings that one experiences when the eyes are surprised. A gray-haired bachelor, who bought a trunk for \$4, lifted the lid to find within a baby's complete wardrobe. There were the tiny stockings, the diminutive shoes and a lot of other things with which his life of celibacy was unacquainted. In another trunk was found a pair of French rapiers, some one's family heirloom probably, while another contained the silk dresses, opera cloak, patent leather shoes and other wearing apparel of a woman. Even the extra front bangs and back switches, together with a small box of rouge and other complexion improvers were included, while in another trunk which was purchased for \$2.55, was a complete Haviland china dinner set.

From a money standpoint the man who bought a case containing 18 slot machines for \$1 took first prize. Individually the machines are worth about \$15 apiece. Evidently the owner decided that Portland's gambling laws were too stringent to permit him to pay even the charges against the case in which they were contained.

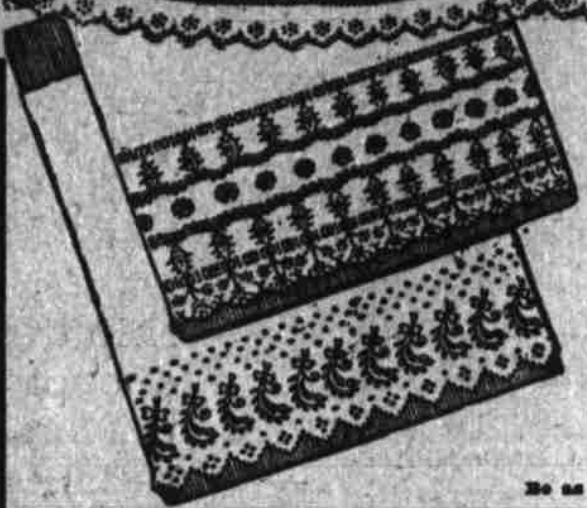
