## DEVELOP SCHOOL OF ENGINEERING

Appropriation for State University Will Be Largely Used for This Purpose.

NO MORE TYPHOID, SAYS CHARLES H. FISHER

Eugene Editor Tells How the Demand for Mechanical, Civil and Electrical Engineers in Northwest Has Effect Upon the Institution.

Charles H. Fisher, editor and publisher of the Eugene Daily Guard, is a visitor in Portland and last night told how happy Eugene citizens, as well as members of the college faculty, are over the large appropriation granted for the state university by the legislature which just closed. Much good is expected from the increased amount, and in telling how it would be used, Mr. Fisher said:

"One of the chief improvements on which a large share of the \$125,000 appropriation will be expended will be in developing an engineering school. The necessity of civil, mechanical and electrical engineers in the northwest has led the faculty and board of regents to prepare plans broadening this department of the university and it will rank with any in the country. The move is popular with the citizens of Eugene and with the state at large.

"A building for and a full course that will be completed in a few years will be provided for. The growth of the school demands such an action. The increase of students seeking an engineering course has led the university authorities to believe that extended improvements along this line of study will be necessary every year. However, other branches of the university will not be neglected and the money will be spent where it is believed it will do the most good.

"One thing which must afford the people of the state much relief is the fact that the water supply in Eugene is now in good condition. All the water is obtained from wells located outside the city limits. No more typhoid epidemics need be feared in Eugene any more. To further improve conditions, the city will probably purchase the water rights this year and put in a system that will insure absolute purity in the water furnished residents.

"Outside of the university, Eugene is prospering and growing daily. We are paving our streets and building an electric railway to Springfield, and a few years hence Eugene will be a city of the future. The ties have been placed along the road and the line will be in operation in a short time.

Mr. Fisher is accompanied by Mrs. Fisher and they came to attend the opera last night. They will leave for Eugene today.

## "Butterfly" Flits

Last night Portland bid a farewell to a company that she has learned to love in three nights. The house was crowded for the last performance of "The Butterfly" and those who had gone to see it Thursday night and Friday night sat still and wondered and wept the same as before.

Rena Vivienne appeared for the first time as Butterfly and walked straight into the hearts of her audience. Personal charm—that is what did it, and no one wondered that Puccini himself, the composer, had selected her as the ideal Butterfly. While less dramatic of voice than Samsony she left nothing to be desired and the clear purity of her first tones sent a thrill through the audience. Her manners were captivating and as she bowed her last curtain call she stood pronounced a singer of lovely voice, a woman of charming appearance, and an actress of splendid conception.

Singing the Puccini role, was Francis Maclean and he supplied the points that Mr. Sheehan lacked. Yet it would be unfair to say that either was better than the other. Maclean made a more pleasing Finkerton but after all one does not care to be pleased with him. And his voice is not as powerful as Sheehan's. The direction deserves praise, however, for its combination of voices leave no room for complaint, but could not be crossed to make a Maclean-Samsony evening.

Miss Ethel Houston has a superb contralto and did magnificent work as Susuki. Mr. Richards sang again the comical role satisfactorily.

Altogether Butterfly will in all its productions call forth nothing but praise as it passes into the realm of recollections, and the wonder was that each night its different cast could sustain so complete the perfection standard.

## AUDIENCE IN STUPOR

Matinee Crowd at "Butterfly" Do Not Demand Response to Curtain.

With the haunting strains of Butterfly's dying denunciation ringing through one's brain, it is difficult to find the words to express the feeling one carries away.

Certainly there was nothing more to be desired in yesterday afternoon's performance. In the principal parts the only change from the first night was in the part of the comical, taken by Wallace Brownlow in splendid style.

It is unnecessary to heap encomiums upon Eliza Samsony and Mr. Sheehan. Mrs. Samsony's voice and dramatic power, no less than her subtle interpretation of the Oriental character of Cho-Cho-San, leave the impression that nothing could be added. Such a tenor robust as Mr. Sheehan has not been heard, perhaps, in the west since Tom-magno appeared in San Francisco in the great opera of the Italian school. Of the greatness of the theme of "Madama Butterfly" and the performance with which it is carried out, much has already been said. One of the greatest of the climaxes, to my mind, was the trio for contralto, tenor and baritone, in the third act, when Finkerton comes to a resolution of the havoc he has wrought.

There was little demand yesterday for the curtain call at the end of the performance. Hearts were too deeply touched, and for the most part we sat in silence and forgot to clap our hands and make a noise.

Coming out into the glare of the streets was strange and not quite pleasant. We were not ready to emerge from the shadow of a deep heart tragedy into the busy and familiar ways.
