LAND FRAUD DEFENDANTS MUST MAKE NEXT MOVE

Williamson, Biggs and Van Gesner Suffer Overruling of Writ of Error by Federal Court of Appeals and Findings of District Court Upheld.

Ex-Congressman J. N. Williamson, Martin R. Biggs and Dr. Van Gesner, convicted of land frauds in the federal court of Portland, have lost one more point in their fight against the verdict of guilty and consequent sentences hanging over them. By the decision of the United States court of appeals of San Francisco, handed down yesterday afternoon from San Francisco, the writ of error applied for by the three defendants was overruled and the findings of the Portland court upheld. In the case of Williamson the court dismissed the writ filed by him on the ground that he had already had a similar writ before the United States supreme court filed on the ground of his constitutional rights as a member of

"The defense has 15 days in which to move for rehearing, or take other action, but until we can find what the grounds taken by the upper court were we will be unable to decide what our next move will be. It is safe to presume, however, that the defense will neglect no avenue left open to it under the law. In the case of Mr. Williamson, he still has a writ of error pending in the supreme court of the United States. There is some doubt, however, whether or not the other two defendants can take their case to that tribunal. Until we are advised on the rulings of the appellate court we cannot tell what will be our next move."

STOCK COMPANY IS TO RUN OREGON CREAMERY

Present Establishment Will Be Improved by Company Which Filed Articles Today.

The Old Oregon Creamery, 106 Fourth street, has changed hands and articles of incorporation have been filed in the county clerk's office. The incorporators are Charles J. Schnabel, Fritz Knecht and C. Knecht. The capital stock of the new company will be \$20,000, divided into 200 shares of \$100 each. It is the intention of the new owners to improve the present place of business and put in new equipment.

Lawyer Schnabel was a member of another company that asked for articles of incorporation yesterday. This is the Charles J. Schnabel Investment company, and he is associated in the new enterprise by E. A. Schnabel and A. F. Smith. The organization was effected by Mr. Schnabel so that he could carry on his realty business separately from his legal affairs. The capitalization of the new company is \$5,000.

LAWS OF GOD ARE NECESSARY TO MANKIND

Bees, Beavers, Sea Fowl and Other Things of Nature Are Governed by Instinct.

Rev. I. D. Driver began a series of sermons last night at the Grace Methodist church which will be held every evening during the week. "The Existence of God" was the subject of last night's discourse.

"Man alone needs the laws of God for his government," said Dr. Driver. "All nature other than man is a law unto itself."

Dr. Driver called attention to the fact that the sea fowl never loses its way, but that man without a compass would be wholly lost; that the beaver builds without line or plummet or rule, but man cannot that the bee never makes the mistake of gathering poisonous honey and that all its honey cells are perfect hexagons, the only shape in which it could make the cell without losing space.

"The moral law," he said, "shows defects in character, but it cannot remedy them any more than the line which shows the bumps on a log can make the log straight."

Tonight Dr. Driver will attempt to prove from a legal standpoint that the Bible is the word of God.
