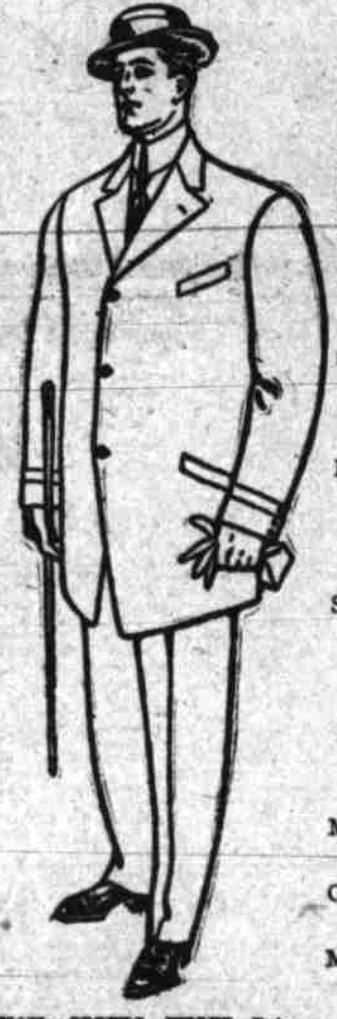

## LONG DELAYS IN STREET WORK

### Contractors Ask Street Committee for Extensions of Time on Contracts.

### MAYOR LANE MAKES SARCASTIC COMMENT

### Warrant Broker Declares He Will Not Finance Any Contract for Work on Streets Where Oregon Real Estate Company is Owner.

"It seems to me that the company has been filling that street with a table-spoon," remarked Mayor Lane when the Pacific Bridge company petitioned the street committee of the executive board for an extension of time for the completion of the filling of Union avenue from Belmont to East Oak street. The company had been at work upon the improvement for many months, and its contract expired February 1. Its representatives asked for 120 days in which to complete the work, alleging that owing to the bad weather they were unable to "dress" the street.

The request drew the comment from the mayor upon the company's progress upon the improvement. After a discussion the company was granted 90 days' extra time. The company was also granted an extension of 30 days for the fill of Montgomery slough and 30 days in which to begin work on East Morrison street.

Money Tied Up.

No bids for the improvement of East Thirtieth street were received because the contractors present and Abe Tichner, a warrant broker, said it was not safe for anyone to risk money in laying the street. Most of the abutting property is owned by the Oregon Real Estate company, which, says Tichner, has invariably refused to pay its street assessments.

"I won't pay anything that it can avoid paying," Tichner declared to Mayor Lane and Commissioners Sabin and Pattullo. "A fine piece of work was done on Clackamas street, and the company was assessed \$1.70 for the improvement. Every property-owner along the street with the exception of the company paid without complaint. The company said the improvement was illegal, and threw the matter into the courts. The result is that that contractor will have to wait a couple of years for his \$1,700. I won't finance any contractors who do work where the Oregon Real Estate company owns a majority of the property."

May Hold Conference.

Mayor Lane suggested that a conference be held between the committee and C. X. Larrabee of the company and the difficulty adjusted. Mr. Larrabee is out of the city, but he is expected back soon.
