

NEW LAWS FOR THE PEOPLE OF OREGON

Many Statutes Added to Code by Last Session of the Legislature.

BOTH THE HOUSE AND SENATE WERE ACTIVE

Bills Passed by Both Branches of Legislature and Afterward Killed by Veto Pen of Governor Chamberlain.

The following is a complete list of the laws enacted by the Twenty-fourth legislative assembly of Oregon. The figures indicate the number of the bill on the calendar of the house in which it originated. Appended is also a list of the bills which passed both houses but were vetoed by the governor.
