ALLEGED LOCKWOOD MADE THEM LOSE COMMISSION
Real Estate Agents Declare They Had Arranged Sale When Owner Refused to Sell.
The suit of William G. Gosalia, Harry L. Hamblin and the Western Investment company against Samuel P. Lockwood to recover a commission of \$5,500 for selling real estate was commenced before Judge Frazer in the state circuit court yesterday afternoon. The afternoon was taken up in securing a jury to hear the case. The plaintiffs allege in their complaint that they agreed to sell a piece of property at \$70,000 and belonging to Lockwood, for which act they were to receive a commission of \$3,500. They allege that they secured a purchaser and when they notified Lockwood that he backed down and refused to sell. The plaintiffs allege that it was through no fault of theirs that the property was not sold and claim their commission for the work they did the same as they would have done had the deal been consummated.

MUSIC DEALERS BUY LOT FOR WAREHOUSES
Another Deal is the Purchase of Property at Seventh and Gilliam for \$19,000.
The fractional lot at the southwest corner of Seventh and Gilliam streets has been sold to a local investor by Senzake & Lyman for \$19,000. The property belonged to R. H. Wallace, and is said to bring a good income on the purchase price. Senzake & Lyman made several other important sales during the past week, among them being a lot on Park between Davis and Everett streets, to Graves & Co., the music dealers, for \$12,500. The new owners will remove the residence on the lot and put up a three-story warehouse. The property belonged to E. S. Jackson, who bought it a month ago for \$12,500. The same firm has sold for the Almslee estate an eight-room residence on the north side of Harrison near Seventh street to J. D. Kenworthy of Wadhams & Kerr Bros. A. E. Lindsay and Captain Graham have each bought a lot on Colonial Heights, on which they will immediately erect modern homes.
