COPPER KING'S MAN IN OREGON'S COPPER BELT

It is Believed His Report May Bring a Butte Magnate in on the Snake River.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Baker City, Or., March 14.—For the purpose of making a general inspection of the copper belt of eastern Oregon, G. M. Allen of Missoula, one of the leading mining men of Montana, passed through Baker City today on his way to Snake river. While he has been prominently identified with Helms in the past, Allen denies that he is here in the interest of that copper-king, although there are rumors afloat to that effect. While he denies being connected with Helms at present Allen admits he will have no difficulty in interesting big capitalists in any property he indorses and that this is the purpose of his visit.

Five years ago Allen was prominently connected with the eastern Oregon copper fields, being the first to discover there was copper on Snake river. The Iron Dyke mine at that time was being worked as an iron proposition solely. He engineered a deal whereby the Iron Dyke, now having 700,000 tons of commercial ore on its surface, changed hands.

Allen's return from the copper belt is awaited with keenest interest here, as it is believed it means the Montana kings are going to invade this district.

ONE KILLED, THREE HURT IN EXPLOSION

(Heart News by Longest Leased Wire.) San Diego, March 14.—By a terrible explosion in the fore-castle of the steamer St. Denis, owned by the Lower California Development company, one man was instantly killed and four others were so seriously injured that they are not expected to live. The explosion occurred while the vessel was moored at the Santa Fe wharf.

Claude Wellman, San Diego, 18 years old, in charge of a donkey hoisting engine is dead.

The injured are: First Officer James Hopper, San Diego. He will die. John Blaine, San Diego, badly burned about the face and shoulders; chances about even. Joseph E. Strada, La Paz, Mex. seaman, badly burned; may die. Jose Parra, Los Angeles, neck, face and hands burned; chances about even.

OREGON CITY SWITCH FREE

With Long Distance Connection With Portland at Ten-Cent Rate.

SUCH THE DEMAND OF FARMER PHONE LINES

Attempt to Do Business With Two Metropolitan Systems Results in Committee to Treat for Best of Terms—Offers Unsatisfactory.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Oregon City, Or., March 14.—Free switch exchange with Oregon City and a 10-cent long-distance rate to Portland, were some of the demands made by representatives of the farmers' mutual telephone lines at a meeting held at the court house this afternoon.

The meeting was called for the purpose of uniting the various farmers' mutual telephone lines in the county in the matter of connecting up with either the Pacific States Telephone company or the new Home Telephone company. Four hundred telephones were represented at the meeting and the majority apparently had a preference for the Home Telephone company.

Louis Funk of the Clear Creek Mutual Telephone company was elected chairman of the gathering and G. A. Schubel of the Beaver Creek line was made secretary.

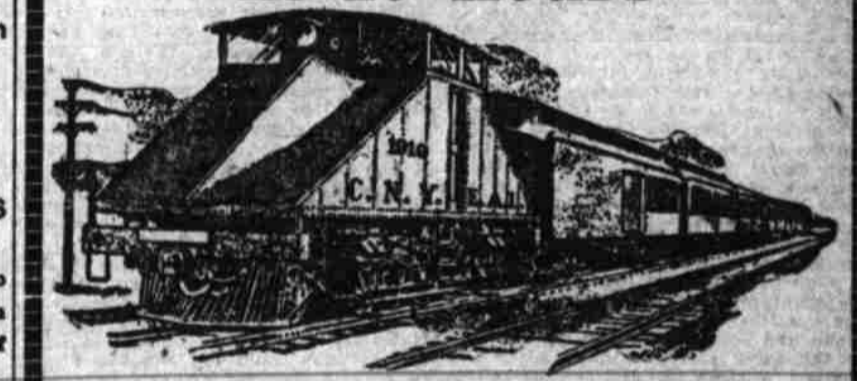
Mr. Gregory of the Pacific States company presented the proposition that his company was willing to furnish the farmers' mutual lines with Oregon City connection on the payment of \$1 per telephone per annum, and a 10-cent long distance rate to Portland. The majority of those present, however, demanded better rates, claiming that connection over their lines was an equal privilege with the use of the Oregon City exchange.

Mr. Turner of the Home Telephone company suggested that a committee be appointed to confer with the rival companies on a specified date. After considerable discussion a motion carried that a committee be made up with one representative from each mutual line, to confer with the two rival companies in Oregon City on March 23.
