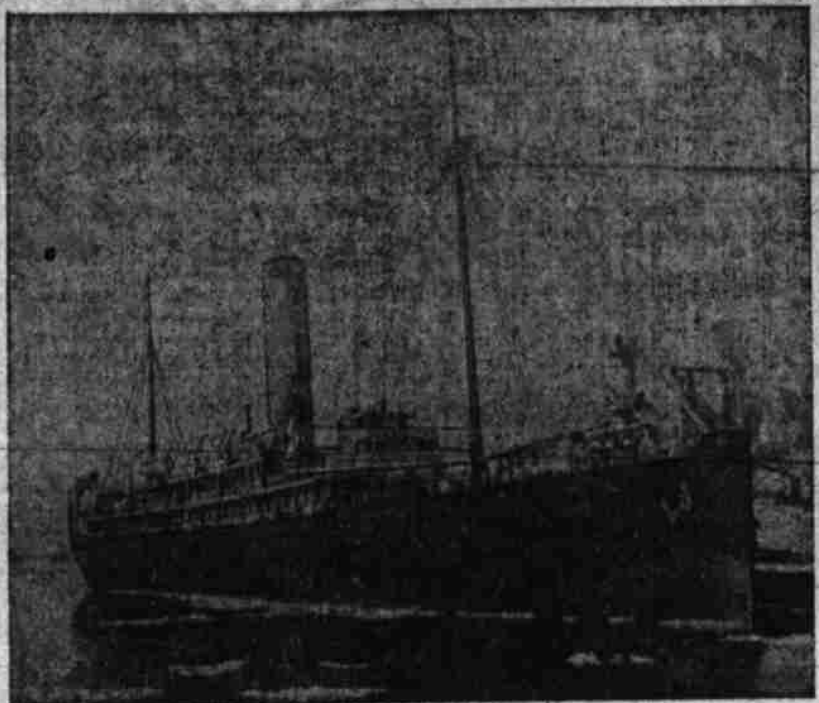


PRESIDENT PREMIER OF PACIFIC COAST SHIPS

New Steamer, Built at Camden for Pacific Coast Company,
Comprises All That Merchant Shipbuilding Has Thus
Far Achieved—Excellent Showing on Trial.

Philadelphia, March 19.—Within a few days the new steamer President, built at the yard of the New York Shipbuilding company at Camden, will leave here for San Francisco to take her place as queen of the Pacific Coast Steamship company's fleet. At the trial trip of the President last Monday she more than realized the hopes of both her builders and owners. There was not a hitch in the exhaustive test the steamer underwent. Her contract speed is 14 knots an hour, yet she made 16.25 knots without an effort. During the trial trip the President also had an opportunity of proving her seaworthiness, for a heavy storm was encountered off Cape May and she rode it out with very little roll and with scarcely a drop of water coming aboard. Captain John H. Rinder, marine superintendent of the Pacific Coast Steamship company, was present at the trial and will take the steamer around the Horn. He is enthusiastic over her performance and says the President will be the finest steamer that sails in the Pacific service.

PINCHOT SAYS GRAZERS MUST COME TO TERMS

Must Pay on Reserves or Be
Barred and Penalized for
Trespass—Test Suit.

Washington, D. C., March 19.—Forester Pinchot announced today that stockmen who refuse to pay grazing fees may be denied future privileges on national forest reserves and when their stock trespasses on reserves they will be required to pay both the damages and the regular grazing fee.

The forester also announced that as the government now has the right of appeal in criminal cases he will cause a test case to be brought before the supreme court to settle once and for all the right of the government to charge a fee for the grazing privilege within national reserves.

GHEENT TO HAVE FEMALE POLICE

Twelve Women Are to Be Appointed as Police—Will Act as Detectives.

NONE BUT WIDOWS AND
OLD MAIDS NEED APPLY

Fascinating Female Sleuths Are Not
Wanted in Ghent—They Must Be
Widows or Unmarried Maids Not
Younger Than Forty-Five.

Berlin, March 19.—The municipality of Ghent has decided to organize a body of female policemen—in fact, of policewomen. It is not, apparently, intended to put the ladies in uniform, or to employ them in the maintenance of order in public; they are to be only 12 in number, and they will form part of the detective force.

Now that France has cab women, Belgium may, not illogically, argue that the time has come when the range of professions open to the sex can properly be extended. And, as a matter of fact, neither romance nor real life has been able to get on without the unofficial aid of skirts in the domain of detective work.

No Pretty Ones Wanted.
Probably there is not a prefect of police on the continent who could not give some curious details as to the part played by the eternal feminine in such matters, and fiction teams with fascinating female agents of the law. The policewomen of Ghent, however, would seem to be likely to lack something on the score of romance, for, unless they are widows, they must be unmarried ladies of not less than 45 years of age.

**WOMEN CLING TO ROCKS
TO ESCAPE RISING TIDE**

Marooned on Island by Tide,
Women Wait for Hours Before Aid Comes.

Avalon, California Island, March 19.—Cut off from the mainland at Avalon by the rising tide, which they had not noticed, Mrs. George L. Drummond and Miss Sutton clung for hours to the slippery rocks below a pebbly beach yesterday and were saved from drowning by Captain Lloyd of the launch Katherine.

When the water cut off their escape they tried to cling to the rocks until the surf began beating against them, throwing them violently against the sharp edges of the rocks, which cut

their legs and arms in many places and whipped their skirts to ribbons. Finally they decided to try to wade ashore, but succeeded only in reaching another rock.

Their cries attracted the attention of Captain Lloyd, but he could not bring his craft close to the rocks and called

for them to wade to the boat. They did so, although the water reached their necks and every wave went over their heads. They were finally rescued, half dead from exposure and fright.
