MODESTLY CALL NAME OF OTHER

Each Republican at Banquet
Makes Suggestion of Somebody Else for Mayor.

DEVLIN ONE OF THE
GUESTS AT DINNER

A Still Bigger Potlatch Is Scheduled
for the Near Future and It Is Expected
Important Announcement Will Follow.

The banquet table was introduced as a useful adjunct to a municipal campaign at the Commercial club last night when State Senator S. C. Beach gave a dinner to some 15 well-known Republicans in hopes that a well-served repast might help to solve the knotty problems of the mayoralty contest and other less troublesome things. At the dinner, after the cigars had been lighted, much talk was indulged in, though the tenor of all the remarks was general and no concrete statements were made.

The dinner had been conceived by Senator Beach and others and was intended as a sort of love feast where Republican warhorses from all stables whatever might mingle without fear that any particular brand of condition powder would be put into the oats.

Devlin a Guest.
Auditor Devlin was one of the guests and when the subject of a good candidate for mayor came up for discussion the remarks were general in tone and confined to the cardinal principle that out of all the Republicans in town one good man ought to be found upon which all Republicans would be able to unite and thus break the Democratic monopoly of the executive office. The different candidates were mentioned, however, and all pronounced to be good men. This was also true all the rest of the way down to the ticket.

Indorsement of labor came up for discussion and it was the sense of the gathering that the labor forces would split up when it came to the showdown, just as they have done in the past. It was also argued that if the new Labor party was going to put a ticket of its own in the field that there was strong probability that some one not as yet mentioned would head the ticket.

It is the intention of those who attended the dinner last night to have another at some time in the immediate future. The next one, however, will be a large affair and will gather in a large percentage of the directing politicians of the old party. At that time the discussion of candidates and conditions will be more definite and to the point and it is expected that a comprehensive suggestion will be made to the people which will include a candidate for each of the offices to be filled at the coming election.

OPERA STARS ARE
SOON TO SHINE HERE

Nordica and Others of San Carlo
Company Are Headed for
Portland.

H. G. Rose, business manager for the San Carlo opera company, reached Portland today to arrange for the coming of the great musical organization which is to appear at the Heilig theatre. Dr. Rose represents Mr. Henry Russell, the brilliant young manager whose successes at Covent Garden, London, and in other great theatres of Europe have made his name famous throughout the musical world.

"The west has hitherto been given but a fleeting glimpse of grand opera through the Metropolitan opera company, and in English by Mr. Savage," said Mr. Rose. "The seasons, altogether too brief, have been so irregularly constructed as to engender a wish that something like permanency might be a feature at the Heilig theatre. The cities of the west where the appreciation of the best in opera is so marked."

The San Carlo opera company numbers 160 artists, under the personal direction of Mr. Russell himself. The orchestra of 50 artists, under the baton of Signor A. Conti of Covent Garden, is an organization with no superior in this country for splendid operatic ensemble. The chorus is composed of 80 artists. It is a superb band of singers, one that will bring joy to the heart of the student and connoisseur in choral effects. These singers come from years of special training under the best masters in Milan, Naples, Florence and other great operatic centers. The stage and ballet are under the direction of Signor Luigi Albertini, who for so many years was connected with the Metropolitan opera house. The ballet, by the way, numbers 20.

The general supervision and the musical direction of the company will be in the hands of Mr. Russell. The two eminent conductors, Arnold Conti of the opera at Buenos Ayres and Covent Garden, and Giuseppe Angelini of the Ariadne theatre, Rome, are splendidly qualified for their important work. In featuring the company Mr. Russell takes pleasure in pointing out the fact that he has secured Madame Nordica, one of the most accomplished, experienced and versatile singers in the world. He also announces a long contract with Miss Alice Nielsen, whose triumphant step from light opera to grand opera has been heralded from coast to coast. The leading tenor is Florenco Constantino, whose successes are celebrated in every center of Europe.

The engagement for Portland is April 2 and 3. Three operas will be sung—"La Gioconda," "La Boheme" and "Carmen." The season will open with "La Gioconda," in which Madame Nordica and Signor Constantino appear, to be followed by "La Boheme," in which Miss Nielsen and Signor Constantino sustain the leading roles. "Carmen" will be sung at the last performance. The engagement includes two evening and one matinee performance.

rest and took him to police headquarters. Upon the plea that it was necessary for him to visit several of the banking institutions, Captain Bailey turned the inebriated watchman loose, with instructions to appear in court this morning. Upon the calling of the case this morning McMillan did not put in an appearance and Judge Cameron issued a bench warrant for his arrest.

Patrolman Phillips upon investigation learned that McMillan visited a restaurant on First near Alder street last night and informed the proprietor that he had a notion to lock him up. Two nights ago McMillan stopped former Deputy District Attorney John Padrum at Third and Washington streets and threatened him with arrest.

Patrolman Bales has reported to Chief Grittmacher that McMillan and a negro, both under the influence of liquor went to the dock of the steamer Pomona at an early hour this morning and abused the watchman, E. Robinson, and 12 of the crew of the craft without any provocation. When ordered away

the men draw revolvers and announced that there would be trouble. Bales later saw McMillan, and he was so drunk that the patrolman contemplated placing him under arrest.

Several months ago McMillan sustained a bullet wound in the leg in front of M. Soller's establishment at Fifth and Pine streets. The watchman maintained that he had surprised three burglars attempting to break into the store and the crooks emptied their revolvers at him.
