

CANVASSERS GO INTO POCKETS

Members of Y. M. C. A. Committees Make Unexpected Start for Campaign.

W. M. LADD ADDS ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS

When Rush to Subscribe Is Over It Is Found That Over Five Thousand Has Been Given or Pledged by the Crowd.

Two big subscriptions in addition to the \$1,000 given by W. M. Ladd were reported to the Y. M. C. A. central committee this morning. F. A. Kriss increased his former subscription of \$1,000 to \$5,000 and H. C. Campbell increased his subscription of \$7,000 to \$10,000. C. F. Swigert also caught the spirit of the day and participated in the Campbell donation.

If 100 men, most of them on salaries, give \$5,000 in half an hour, what will Portland give?

Everybody Takes Part.

This morning the men who are going to canvass the city this week for the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. building fund raised in about 30 minutes \$5,000 among themselves and almost every dollar meant some personal sacrifice. Men who had given before gave again and before the subscription hour was over some men who had not intended to give at all had caught the spirit of the time and had given for every member of their family and had gone over the back fence and brought in the names of their neighbors to swell the total. And every dollar of the \$5,000 is down in black and white and will be paid.

The everybody-gives campaign for the association building fund started off this morning as no other local money getting campaign ever did. After the breakfast at the Oregon hotel grill, Mr. Stone told the members of the committee that he believed they would work harder at the job if they themselves had a part in the work and offered the men present a chance to give individually. At the outset the mark was set at \$3,500 and nobody but Stone imagined that this amount of money could be secured from the men present.

One man had been out to a couple of small suburban churches yesterday and had secured a subscription list of \$50, all of which was given by working people and meat sacrifices. Then the committee commenced to catch the spirit of the hour and chairman after chairman sent up pledges aggregating \$100 for the committee of four. A. F. Fiegl added \$100 to his former subscription. Secretary Stone gave another \$100. Walter Goss added \$100 more and every man in the room commenced to send up his donation.

For each of family. In another part of the grill were some commercial travelers and Goss, to keep his hand in, made them a speech and came back with a gold piece, and then the subscriptions came in too fast to be counted. The total was somewhere over \$5,000 and everybody was wondering where the few hundred was coming from to make it \$5,000, when W. E. Ladd announced that he would give \$250 for each of his children and \$250 for his wife. \$1,000 in all.

That made the total over \$4,000 and the crowd yelled, "Make it \$5,000, Stone."

Mr. Fiegl gave \$10 more for each of his children and as he had eight it was no small gift. Another man had a mother-in-law he thought was worth \$10, another added \$50 to his subscription for his mother and the list of relatives commenced to pile up and the total to lengthen toward the \$5,000 goal.

Others for Donors. All over the room men of slender means were giving from \$10 to \$100 and the pile of subscription cards was mounting higher and higher each minute. Gold and silver was given, too, and every donation brought out a roar of applause as it was announced.

There was a lull about the time the total stood \$4,900 and then half a dozen men, who had already given, jumped to their feet and gave again and when the rush was over the total stood \$5,000, given by the men who have donated a week's time to canvass the town.

When the result was announced the hundred men aching up and gave three cheers for Mr. Ladd that made the glasses jump, then three more and a cheer for the committee.

"We will get that \$50,000," howled one youth who had himself given a month's salary.

"We will, we sure will," yelled the crowd and the everybody-gives campaign was emphatically on.

HOW TO DRIVE THE BLUES AWAY

Dr. Brougher Says a Clear Conscience Will Help Any One Wonderfully.

FIND OUT THE CAUSE OF DESPONDENCY

Pastor of White Temple Advises His Hearers to Remember That God Is Able to Cope With Every Emergency That May Arise.

Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougher spoke at the White Temple last night on "The Fight With the Blues." He mentioned the different causes of despondency, particularly disappointment, distressing circumstances, disobedience, doubt and a morbid disposition. Speaking of the latter he said:

"There are some people who naturally look on the dark side of life. They get their griefs, they seem to enjoy poor health, and are happiest when they are miserable. They see the clouds, but never the rainbow."

"But what are we going to do to get rid of the blues? First, find out the cause. If the source is any of those already mentioned, then meet the difficulty with courage. Be master of your desires, and the circumstances of life. Exercise your will power and use every means possible to conquer the source of your despondency. If you have done wrong, make a clean breast confession of the fact to God, and get right. Have a conscience void of offense toward God and man. Ask God to give you the spirit of a sound mind and a cheerful heart. Whatever you cannot overcome, then patiently accept and make the best of it. 'Grieve and bear it.' Get into the best physical, spiritual and mental condition possible. Renewed physical and spiritual strength will almost always drive away the blues and make life worth the living."

"Trust God and believe in his love and power. Remember that he can make all things work together for good to them that love him. There is no circumstance in life, no emergency that may come to us that God is not equal to. Never doubt that God loves you. Never doubt that he knows what is best for you. Never doubt if you are right, he will be with you."

DISCUSSION SERIES OPENS

Rev. Hiram Vrooman Leads Remarks on "What Is Religion?"

The first free religious discussion in the Swedenborgian church, Knights of Pythias hall, was held last night. Rev. Hiram Vrooman introduced the subject "What Is Religion?" and a general discussion followed. Mr. Vrooman said in part:

"Religion is not an external possession or prize such as a life insurance policy which is paid for by church attendance and contributions and by various prayers. Any man's religion is primarily his dominant purpose in respect to right and wrong."

"Any man whose ruling love leads him, as a perpetual force, to be more friendly to the right than to the wrong is a religious man, whereas he whose ruling love disregards the right in favor of the wrong is irreligious."

"Religion in a life, however, is never stationary. Unless destroyed by wicked conduct it grows and its growth means two things especially, viz: the ruling love gradually becomes more unselfish or altruistic in quality, and the spiritual intelligence very gradually acquires clearer vision of spiritual truths or religious doctrines."

"Our statements of religious belief are related to the quality of our ruling love somewhat as feathers are related to the bird and as leaves to the tree. It is an organic relationship. It might be called psychological. If a man is ruled by an inner selfish egotism which is unwilling that there should be a power and an intelligence and a love so superior to his own that he must bow before a ruler and humble himself as a servant of his dependence upon them as his Creator and Preserver, then that person is apt to deny the existence of a personal God. The vast majority of those who deny the existence of a personal God do so because of a deep seated and vicious egotism, or pride of self intelligence, which turns spiritual reasoning to sophistry and thereby supplies them with what seems to be a rational basis for their infidelity. Our conceptions of God are, as it were, stalks or sprouts of logic and reason shooting up from the soil of our predominant ruling love. And, strange as it may seem, the fact is that logic and reason will accommodate themselves to exactly opposite religious conceptions. A man's beliefs in respect to God and to other religious problems, while they will always bear the semblance of rational deduction, are determined in the first instance by the quality of his ruling love."

Christian Scientists Make Sharp Answers to His Lecture.

Dr. Brougher made public answer to some of the letters he had received from Christian Scientists as a preface to his sermon yesterday morning. He read extracts from one of them showing the way in which his discussion of the cult was resented by members of it and in which the words "periodical vilification," "bullying," "ignorance" and "malice" found prominent part. The writer of the letter quoted also accused Dr. Brougher of being a "sensational preacher in league with the yellow press."

In reply Dr. Brougher disclaimed any intention to persecute when he referred to the letters. He said that the work of the world at an age equal to that of Mrs. Eddy who is now unable to appear in public. He closed by saying that he regretted not being able to accept the teachings of Christian Science as true, for if it were true it would be a most self-sufficient and complacent creed.

INSPIRED BY CALVARY

Dr. Heppie Declares Great Poets Dipped Pens in Crimson Flood.

"And Pilate wrote a title and put it on the cross. And the writing was, 'Jesus of Nazareth, the king of the Jews,'" was the text chosen by Dr. William Heppie for his sermon at the Centenary Methodist church yesterday morning. "This placard or writing placed by Pilate on the cross," said Dr. Heppie, "had been of great importance to the history of the world, for it proclaimed salvation to the whole world."

The hand of Pilate was directed by the Divine in writing this placard, declared the speaker.

Handling his subject from another standpoint, Dr. Heppie said: "There never could have been a Shakespeare, a Tennyson, a Whitman or a Milton, but for a Calvary. These men found their inspiration at the cross of Calvary and dipped their pens in the crimson flood."

Superstition Mars Dedication of New Synagogue That Cost Half a Million Dollars—Fire Is Supposed to Burn Year After Year.

Pittsburg, March 25.—The dedication of the new half-million-dollar Tree of Life synagogue here yesterday was marred by the fears of the congregation that some terrible calamity is certain to happen because the "eternal fire," which was lighted in the new synagogue on Friday, was extinguished in some mysterious manner. Some of the superstitious members of the congregation are certain that the extinguishing of the fire portends some great evil.

In every synagogue the "eternal fire" burns before the altar year in and year out, never having been extinguished. When the Tree of Life congregation started to move from their old synagogue at Third avenue and Ross street to the new edifice on Craft avenue last Friday, the altar fire was lighted in the new edifice and the fire that had burned for years in the old edifice was extinguished.

Yesterday when the janitor arrived at the Craft avenue building, he was startled to find that the "eternal fire" had gone out during the night.

The rabbis were summoned in haste and an investigation was made to determine what had caused the fire to cease burning.

Every effort was made to keep the affair from the members of the congregation, but it became known yesterday when 500 Hebrews gathered at the dedication of the new synagogue. They made no effort to hide their fear and gloom was cast over what would otherwise have been a joyous occasion.

TOWN MARSHAL SHOOT

AT DUKE'S AUTOMOBILE

Chauffeur Speeded Up When the Marshal Tried to Stop Car and Drew Fire.

(Journal Special Service.) Washington, March 25.—While Miss Rhoda Shonta, one of the daughters of former Panama Canal Commissioner Shonta, Duke Albert De Luynes Dechaules at De Piquigny of Paris, who is visiting the Shontas family, and two other guests were speeding along in a high power motor car near Glen Echo, Maryland, yesterday afternoon, they were fired at twice by the town marshal.

The automobile ran at high speed and Marshal Collins held up his hands in warning. The chauffeur, however, only increased the speed to what the marshal says was 60 miles an hour. Knowing that there was no other way for them to return to town, the marshal waited.

An hour later he saw a car coming enveloped in dust. He stood in the middle of the roadway, waving his arms and shouting. He narrowly escaped being run down and jumped to one side as the car whizzed by. Marshal Collins then fired two shots. None of the party was injured although all were badly frightened.
