

MARVELOUS GROWTH OF HEARST NEWS SERVICE

PROGRAM FOR DIPPING SHEEP

Board at Pendleton Meeting Placed Matters in Shape for Action.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., March 27.—W. H. Steusloff has returned from Pendleton, where he attended the first meeting of the state board of sheep commissioners. He reports a harmonious meeting.

Mr. Steusloff said he believed the board had arranged for an efficient enforcement of the sheep dipping law, in that the interest of D. H. S. McClure of the bureau of animal industry had been obtained to cooperate with the state inspector and county inspectors for enforcing the law and to eradicate scab. The dipping is to be under the supervision of the federal government and the state board of commissioners has deputized a full corps of federal inspectors as state deputies, of which there will be about 25.

Condition of Valley Sheep.
In the first district, which comprises 15 counties, E. N. Hutchinson of Portland and three others will have charge of inspecting. One inspector will be located at Salem, one at Eugene and one at Medford. It is planned to make an inspection of every sheep in the first district.

Dr. McClure, in conversation, Mr. Steusloff reports as having said the condition of the sheep in the Willamette valley was very good. In Marion county there is no scab, or practically none. In Polk about 5 per cent are affected; in Lane about 54 per cent; in Linn about 75 per cent and in Yamhill 25 per cent. In Jackson about 800 sheep are free from the disease.

Dipping Arrangements.
In this district there are about 40,000 sheep. The dipping will begin early in May under federal inspection and there will be no expense to the owners except that of providing for the vat and dipping mixtures. The old lime-sulphur dip can be used and any of the recognized dips approved by the government can all be used if according to the requirements.

The old lime-sulphur dip is mixed as follows: Twenty-four pounds of sulphur and eight pounds of unslacked lime added to 100 gallons of water, to be heated for at least two hours under a temperature of from 105 to 110 degrees Fahrenheit. In order to make the expense reasonable in the case of the smaller sheepmen of the Willamette valley, it has been suggested by Dr. Lytle that the owners get together and purchase a portable dip, which could be used by all the sheep owners of a certain community. The next meeting of the commission will be held in Portland in three or four weeks.

WORSHIP OF SATAN IS REVIVED BY PARISIANS

Police Raid Temple and Find Effigy of Mephisto on Black Altar.

Paris, March 27.—The cult of devil worshippers, whose scandalous orgies shocked all Paris some years ago, has been revived. A quiet café was selected as the temple for carrying out the blasphemous ritual associated with the worship of Satanism. The temple was fitted up in imitation of a church. Anonymous communications acquainted the police with what was going on.

The worshippers were in the habit of assembling nightly at the temple. The police proceeded to the upstairs room, which had been fitted with thick doors and iron shutters, and further protected from prying eyes by the addition of a black curtain. The police inquiries brought to light the fact that the "black mass" was celebrated nightly. There was an altar, covered with black, on which was set a effigy of Mephisto. The whole ceremony was a travesty of Christian worship.

The devil worshippers appear to have been aware of the intended raid, and so they fled in time, thus enabling the police. All they left behind was a number of documents dealing with their ritual and a luxuriously-fitted room.
