

OREGON WINS TWO DEBATES

Affirmative Team Is Winner at Eugene and Negative Team at Moscow.

NEGRO SHOULD AND SHOULD NOT VOTE

Fifteenth Amendment on Trial and Oregon's Resourcement Champions Establish Both Sides of the Case—Idaho Defeats Washington.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., March 28.—The University of Oregon debating team won from the team of the University of Washington here last night, arguing the question whether the fifteenth amendment and the second section of the fourteenth amendment of the federal constitution should be abolished.

The Oregon speakers assumed the affirmative and won a complete victory over their opponents from the north. The members of the Oregon team are: John C. Vestch, John R. Latourette and Clarence L. Whalson. The Washington team was composed of E. M. Hawes, C. W. Hall and W. B. Rasmussen. The judges were Dr. S. H. Johnson and Judge M. C. George of Portland, and J. K. Weatherford of Albany.

The Washington team proved foremost worthy of Oregon's wit. Every man in a post-graduate William Rasmussen, who led the debate for Washington, is a graduate of Pacific university and is now taking post-graduate work at Seattle. He is a well-known debater. Charles W. Hall is also an old man in debates, and had promised his friends to move heaven and earth to win, for once before he had gone down to defeat. E. M. Hawes, the third colleague of the Washington team, is their student body manager.

This is the question debated. The fifteenth amendment, the subject of debate, is as follows:

"Section 1. The right of the citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any state on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude."

"Sec. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article."

"Section 3. of the fourteenth amendment reads:

"Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states, according to their respective numbers, counting as whole persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president, or for members of congress, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being 21 years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens 21 years of age in such state."

The Affirmative Team Established.

J. C. Vestch, son of R. M. Vestch of Cottage Grove, is considered by some as the most remarkable debater in the university, for he is one of the remarkable few who have made a debating team in his freshman year. Vestch also won the alumni medal debate last year. For two years he has been the leader of the team which has beaten Washington and this year tries again. The Seattle newspapermen last year devoted over a column to him alone, part of which was filled with such names as the "red-headed demon." While Vestch in track work was never a Kelly or Moore, he has been a good point winner for the varsity during the last three years. He is the wisest and a brilliant mind, which he uses in class work as well as in debate, and during his residence at the university has become a very prominent student. He will probably go into newspaper work when he graduates in June, but has ability, both as a writer and as an artist.

J. R. Latourette, "Jack," Oregon's plucky and heady quarterback for the last four years, is a talker who at times excites and at other times soothes. He is third colleague on the affirmative this year, and was a debater on the same side last year. He lives at Oregon City but will probably go to Columbia next year, as he graduates this year.

C. L. Whalson of Shasta, formerly of Pacific university, is the first freshman to make an Oregon team since the time of Vestch and he has done that orator one better in the position, for where Vestch held the position of second colleague, Whalson won first. In fact, it is said if he had the required experience he might have won the leadership of the team for the year. Whalson will probably take up the law as his profession.

Sketches of Negative Men.

The records of the negative team, which debated with Idaho last night, are as follows:

F. V. Galloway, son of Judge Galloway of McMinnville, was the representative of Oregon in the intercollegiate association, and won second place in his home town this year. He was also in the same contest last year, securing a similar place. He was leader of the negative team, debating at Moscow against Idaho. Last year he was first colleague on the affirmative. Galloway is a popular man here, being president of the senior class. He will probably take up the law.

S. H. Bond, a Lane county boy, whose home is on the Sulaw, is what is known as an "All A" student, and so when he won the place of first colleague on the negative team this year it was no surprise. Last year he was a member of the Intersociety-Freshman team for the Laurens. Bond is also preparing for the law.

T. H. Townsend is a sophomore from Roseburg, who won the place of second colleague on the negative team. He is very ambitious and with his natural ability will become a very prominent man before he graduates. Townsend is holding his aim to the law. He already holds several offices.

VICTORY ALSO AT MOSCOW

Oregon's Team Superior to Veteran Debaters of the Gem State.
