OWNERS OF ROMAN EMPIRE

C. L. Parrish's Collection Includes Those Coined Before the Christian Era.

MANY NUMISMATISTS EXHIBITING TREASURES

Mrs. Groves, Owner of German Piece Over Two Hundred Years Old, Recently Lost Bracelet Made of Old Coins.

Portland never knew it had so many old coins until a discussion of the matter in the columns of the Journal opened up the old chests and brought forth pieces of money that make the age of Methuselah look like a kindergarten.

C. L. Parrish, who in reality started the discussion and hunt for old money by his assertion a few days ago, that he believed the continental dollar of 1776 to be the oldest American coin in Portland, this morning laid claim to the distinction of having also the

oldest foreign coin in Portland. It is not likely that his claim will be disproved, unless some one digs up a coin from an Egyptian sarcophagus and brings it here for that purpose.

In the Parrish collection are two silver coins which circulated in the Roman empire. One of them is a silver denarius, which was coined in the year 293 B. C. and is, therefore, 1,712 years of age and still in good health.

Not until some one else brings forth a coin older than the two Roman ones noted the latter will probably hold their record proudly as the oldest preserved residents of Portland.

There have been many responses to the old coin question. The numerous replies establish the fact that Portland has a large family of pieces of ancient money, both American and foreign.

Mrs. Lena Groves, 524 Raleigh street, German 4-cent piece bearing date of 1769. Mrs. Groves recently lost a bracelet made of old coins, many of which were American pieces.

Tricky Turkish coins. Mrs. E. P. Chard, 131 East Twenty-second street north, has an English coin dated 1772, and John Finley, who lives at the Lindley hotel, has an English sovereign of 1774, which was the first money earned by his father.

During the day several copper pieces bearing the inscription "Sultante Brumet" have been shown. On the reverse side is the Turkish star and hieroglyphics with the date 1304. But the coins are not as old as is indicated by the first glance, due to the fact that there is a difference between the reckoning of the Moslem and Christian time of some 537 years.

Among those who have old coins in their possession is O. H. Hlatt, 1423 East Everett street. Mr. Hlatt is exhibiting an old coin of the denomination of one-half cent that was minted in 1804. Because of its age the coin is said to be quite valuable.
