Beer Makers Declare Open Shop and Employ All Who Seek Work.

St. Louis, April 1.—Open shop was put into effect this morning by all the breweries in this city and East St. Louis, in accordance with the ultimatum issued by the brewers Saturday night that if workers did not return to work Monday morning this measure would be adopted.

The unions will not be recognized as organizations and all persons applying will be employed regardless of affiliations. Hundreds of workmen, some union, and some non-union, were given work at the various plants this morning and the situation was asked.
