GIVE REST TO STORE CLERKS
Plan of Consumers' League Which Meets Tomorrow for General Discussion.

CLOSE SHOPS SATURDAY AFTERNOONS IN AUGUST
Rabbi S. S. Wise Last Year Pointed Out That Money Could Be Tainted by the Spending as Well as by the Making of It.

An open meeting of the Consumers' league is to be held tomorrow (Tuesday) afternoon at 4 o'clock at Trinity parish house, Nineteenth near Everett streets, when the subject is to be discussed of closing the department stores during the month of August and an early closing throughout the whole summer.

Rev. E. E. S. Ely will make suggestions concerning the means and methods for formulating public opinion on such matters. He will speak from personal experience, for he resided in Rockford, Illinois, when the result was obtained for that city.

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise in an address delivered in this city a year ago said: "Reinforcing the aim to secure livable conditions for the producer or the world's workers is the recognition of the truth that money may be tainted in its spending as truly as in its getting. Money must not be gotten or gained without regard to the rights of others. Some things money or its possessor dare not buy, the things that the making of which have been consumed men's ill-requited toil, woman's easily depleted strength and the life-blood of little children."

P. McDonald, editor of the Labor Press, will address the meeting from the wage-earner's side of the question, and W. P. Olds of Olds, Wortman & King will speak from the employer's point of view.

TAMALES MADE UNDER UNCLEANLY CONDITIONS
Mrs. Evans Reports Slight Improvements in One Factory, but Afghans Are Still Bad.

"A visit to the tamale factories proved them to be in a filthy and loathsome condition," reported Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, deputy health officer, to the city board of health this morning.

The Eagle brand place is conducted by a Chinaman, and a second visit to his place showed some improvements. The other places are conducted by Afghans and in a room where they sleep and eat.

"I occasionally find grocery stores and meat markets where the living rooms are only separated from the shops by a half partition, and the only ventilation is through the stores."

Mrs. Evans also reports that the bakers of the city will contest any ordinance framed to compel them to wrap loaves of bread at the bakery, as it would work a hardship upon them.

During March she visited a total of 274 shops, markets and stores, meat and fish markets taking first place with 76 visits. The proprietors of the rival First and Alder street markets were both arrested and fined \$25 for rendering fat and cooking meat contrary to the city ordinances.

The plants of both men have since been removed and the practice stopped.

Mrs. Evans says: "One case of poisoning from meat was reported but the evidence did not justify any action on the part of the health officer. I turned over this sample of meat and a sample of olive oil that was sent me to the pure food commissioner, who reported no deleterious matter in either."

HOT CAMPAIGN CLOSES TODAY

St. Johns Voters Will Settle Squabble Between Partisans of That City.

THREE TICKETS TO BE MARKED BY ELECTORS

Bitter War Has Been Waged Against Recorder Thorndyke, Though It Seems Probable Couch, Also Republican, Will Be Elected.

The election in progress at St. Johns today closes the most bitter and heated municipal campaign ever experienced in that city. Both sides have resorted to every conceivable method of snatching victory from the complicated situations that have developed.

A libel suit and mandamus proceeding have grown out of the feeling that has been aroused. The breach between the factions has been so widened as the election approached that there are indications that the feeling may not be allayed for some time.

The Three Platforms. A forecast is difficult. All who are interested in the campaign claim everything in sight for their favorite candidates. There are a great many people in St. Johns, however, who have not been greatly interested.

Promises have been as numerous as in any campaign. The Republicans have rested on their title and believe victory can rest nowhere else with security except on their banner.

As far as can be determined the election of K. Couch, republican candidate for mayor, would not be a great surprise. Mr. Couch is very well liked and has not been attacked in the slightest way during the campaign.

After Thorndyke's Scalp. The bitter battle has been made against Recorder W. L. Thorndyke, Republican candidate for reelection. People's supporters are united on their candidate, E. M. Esson. The election of Thorndyke is very doubtful.

Where the People's and Independents stalwarts are united on a councilman that candidate has a very good chance. There will be considerable scratching when it comes to picking out councilmen, but the prospects favor the People's and independent candidates rather than the Republicans.
