SITE FOR NAVAL BASE NEAR SANTA BARBARA Portland Man Acts as Government Agent in Buying Property.

Private advice from Santa Barbara as to the effect that F. W. Leadbetter of Portland has purchased the Dible estate of several hundred acres, near that point, for the United States government, and that a naval base will be established on the property.

It is said that Leadbetter acted in a similar capacity some years ago for the government in the purchase of the site for the Bremerton navy yard and drydock on Puget sound and that fact is taken as color for the report of his purchase at Santa Barbara.

In addition to fortifying the hill with the most powerful and modern ordnance, the plans of the government are said to include the building of a steel breakwater of modern invention, the patent of which has recently been secured by the United States.

STEAMER SILDRA MAINE COME HERE

Report Has Another Large Norwegian Tramp Chartered for Portland.

HORNELEN WILL BE HERE NEXT WEEK WITH CEMENT Sildra Has Just Arrived at San Francisco With a Cargo of Phosphates From Ocean Islands and the Hornelen Recently Reached San Pedro

It was reported this morning that the Norwegian steamer Sildra might come here to load lumber for the orient. She arrived at San Francisco a few days ago with a cargo of cement, half of which is to be delivered here.

The Norwegian steamer Hornele will be here some time next week, so a letter from Captain Swensen states. The steamer arrived at San Pedro a few days ago with a cargo of cement, half of which is to be delivered here.

The Norwegian steamer Terje Viken, which arrived here yesterday, hooked head winds for 35 days on the way from Newcastle, Australia. This is considered remarkable for every minute of the time the wind blew strong and in the opposite direction to the steamer, so that she had to fight dutifully hard to cover the 5,600 miles between the two ports.

The Terje Viken went to the O. & C. dock this morning to discharge a cargo of 5,000 tons of coal for the Southern Pacific line. Captain Guilleken says the voyage from Australia was uneventful, except for the constant winds and heavy seas, which did no damage.

The steamer will probably take lumber from here to Port Pirie, Australia, as she did on her last visit here. She is still under time charter to J. J. Moore & Co., but has so far not received orders where to load.

Captain Guilleken is of the opinion that Australia will buy large quantities of lumber here if it can be obtained, as there is a great activity in the mining industry over there, a veritable boom being on in some parts of the interior of Australia.
