VARIOUS DISTRICTS.

Attitude Stated to Be That of Opposition on General Principles.

(Special Dispetch to The Journall)

Joseph, Or., April 3.—The recent developments in the forest reserve enlargements in Wallowa county have all been borne with a good deal of patience by citizens, though there is no question a great majority of the people are opposed to the system as applied here. The various excuses and explanations of the forestry officials have all excited comment here on account of their inaccuracies, but it remains for Special Agent H. D. Langille to give an account of how the system is regarded in Wallowa county and the conditions it remedied here. In a recent issue of The Journal he is quoted as saying:

"The proposal to make a forest reserve in Wallowa county was bittarily opposed, but today the range troubles there are all settled, and I do not believe the stockmen have any further objections to make to the department's policy. It is generally admitted by all classes that the preservation of the forests, and regulation of the ranging of stock in them, is the best thing for all concerned." Great Northern Advances Over FOUR AND HALF HIGHER Good Statement Expected Today in Southern and Union Pacific-Each Rise 314 Points-Money

Mever Were Bange Troubles.

This statement has provoked much comment here. It is true that the proposal for a forest reserve in this county was opposed, and leading citizens maintain to this day that there was no necessity for it. The alleged range troubles in Wallowa county are all imaginations, for there never were any here. This county was conspicuous among the eastern Oregon counties for years in that the cattlemen and sheepmen had no trouble and were unhampered in the use of winter and summer range by any regulations of some government bureau, or by the administration of such regulations by some all-wine official.

Opposed on General Principles.

Opposed on General Principles.

Mr. Langille's belief that Wallowa stockmen have no "Turther objections to the department's policy" is a most errogeous one. They are all opposed to it on general principles, though many do not antagonise the policy further, believing it to be useless. Very few are satisfied with their allotments under the administration of the reserves, since in many cases they are serves, since in many cases they are changed miles from their former ranges, and still further fault is found ranges, and still further fault is found this year with the granting of permission to a number of Baker county men to use ranges in this county. It is asserted positively by many in Wallowa that these foreign men never ranged there before. But the officials, in line with the constant policy of knowing what is best for mere citizens, gave it to them. These things, with many more that could be detailed, show that the cattlemen do have "further objections."

Becent Addition Severs Blow. The recent addition of 781,000 acres in Wallowa county to the forest reserve was one of the heaviest blows the county has received in many years. A good deal more than half of the county good deal more than half of the county is now in one combined reserve, known as the Imnahs. It is explained that all the agricultural land will be selected and thrown open for settlement in the near future. But hundreds and hundreds of acres of the late addition is not "agricultural" nor has it a tree nor a shrub on it. While such lands are in a reserve the fittle is in the government and the county loses any chance it might have to obtain taxes from it.

Doom of the Small Gracier.

Of course, the sheap or cattle which range upon it may be taxed, and likewise must the owner pay "grazing fees" to Uncle Sam for the grass. Additional herders are required under the reserve system, especially as the officials require bands to be kept not only on their allottiments, but on the reserve as well. The consequence is the small owner is at about the same expense the larger one is, which, together with the constant crowding caused by newcomers and the increase of grazing fees, foreshadows the elimi nation of the small man,

Paying Poos, With Test Pending. With reference to the matter of pay-ing the grazing fees upon the former Wallowa and Chesnimnus reserves, it may be stated that practically all of the stockmen are paying them, though perstockmen are paying them, though per-haps a few will take the chance. Upon the publication of the Coombs letter of Senator Fulton, a number of cattle and sheepmen consulted local attorneys, sheepmen consulted local attorneys, who advised that owing to the conflict of decisions and the determination of Colorado cattlemen and the government as well to press the legality of the grazing charges to speedy determination by the courts of last resort, these smaller owners would better pay. As stated, most of them have done so.
