GET READY FOR NEW BUILDINGS

Directors of Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. Agree on Division of Property.

Final steps in the work of the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. in securing their new joint home, were completed yesterday when the boards of directors of the association decided at a meeting held at the Y. M. C. A. to purchase the Ainsworth property and proceed with the construction of the new home as

soon as possible. The following resolution was passed:
"At a joint meeting of the respective boards of directors and trustees of the Young Men's Christian Association and the Young Women's Christian Association held April 3, 1907, the following plan for the acquisition of property, the division of funds and the preparation for the erection of buildings was adopted, to wit:
"That the boards of the two associations, following the action taken by each separately, confirm the action of the executive committee in securing an option on the Ainsworth property, being the south half of the block lying between Sixth, Seventh, Taylor and Yamhill streets, at the price of \$150,000, and direct the executive committee to conclude the purchase at that price.
"That of the ground purchased, the west 40 feet facing on Taylor street, be apportioned to the Young Women's Christian Association, and that the portion of purchase price to be paid therefor be fixed at \$25,000, and that the remaining portion of said half block, being

140 feet on Taylor street and 100 feet on Sixth street, be apportioned to the Young Men's Christian Association, and that the portion of purchase price to be paid therefor be fixed at \$115,000.
"That the two boards recommend to the joint executive committee, which has had charge of the raising of funds, that a bank be selected as treasurer; that all collections on account of subscriptions be deposited in such bank, and that the bank pay over to the treasurer of the Young Men's Christian Association seven tenths of all moneys thus coming into its hands, and to the treasurer of the Young Women's Christian Association three tenths of all such

moneys, in accordance with the agreement between the respective associations at the beginning of the campaign.
"That the Young Women's Christian Association withdraw for its sole and separate use the \$5,000 raised by it before the beginning of the joint campaign.
"That the Young Men's Christian Association withdraw from the joint fund and have for its sole and separate use all funds that may arise from sale of its property at Fourth and Yamhill streets.
"That it be recommended to the respective building committees and to the executive committee that the same architect be selected for both buildings and that the exterior of the buildings be made to conform in design and appearance.
"That so far as practicable and as may seem wise the architect shall let the separate contracts for portions of the respective buildings to the same contractors, at the same time.
"That one lighting and heating plant be made to serve both buildings, the

Young Men's Christian Association to pay seven tenths of cost of installation, maintenance and operation, and the Young Women's Christian Association to pay three tenths thereof.
"That the \$45,000 intended to be applied from the subscriptions toward the endowment of the Young Men's Christian Association to meet the Corbett bequest be taken entirely from the seven tenths of subscriptions apportioned to said association, and not from the joint fund."

Silverton Bond Election.
(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Silverton, Or., April 4.—The city of Silverton will vote on the question of bonding the city for \$5,000, on the first Monday in May, with a view of purchasing a steam road roller. A rock crusher was purchased a month or more ago, absorbing all the surplus money in the treasury, and if the roller is purchased it will be necessary to bond the city. A warm time is anticipated owing to the fact that some of the citizens are opposed to the improvement.
