

ELECT OFFICERS FOR THE YEAR

Knights and Ladies of the Macco-bees Conclude Con-vention.

SHERWOOD AGAIN MADE STATE COMMANDER

Supreme Commander of Women's Branch, Mrs. Lillian M. Hollister of Detroit, Makes Report Showing Growth of Order Everywhere.

After electing officers for the ensuing term, selecting delegates to the supreme tent at Chicago in August, hearing reports of officers and transacting other business of importance, the fifth triennial convention of the Knights and Ladies of Macco-bees were concluded last night.

For the fourth consecutive term State Commander J. W. Sherwood of this city was re-elected to the position by the Knights of Macco-bees. He has been in charge of the order in this state since its organization 15 years ago.

J. S. Van Winkle of Albany was elected supreme representative to the supreme tent, Knights of Macco-bees, which is to be held in Chicago in August. O. C. Johnson of Baker City was chosen alternate. The Ladies of Macco-bees selected Mrs. Clara Knott of this city as their representative to the supreme tent, which will convene at Detroit, Michigan, in July.

The various tents of the Macco-bees of this city appointed a committee to prepare plans and select a site for a permanent home for the order in Portland. Resolutions were adopted commending Commander Sherwood for his work in behalf of the order.

An open meeting was held last night in the W. O. W. hall under the auspices of the combined hives, Ladies of the Macco-bees. Addresses were made by Mrs. L. M. Hollister of Detroit, Michigan, and Miss Bina M. West of Port Huron, Michigan. 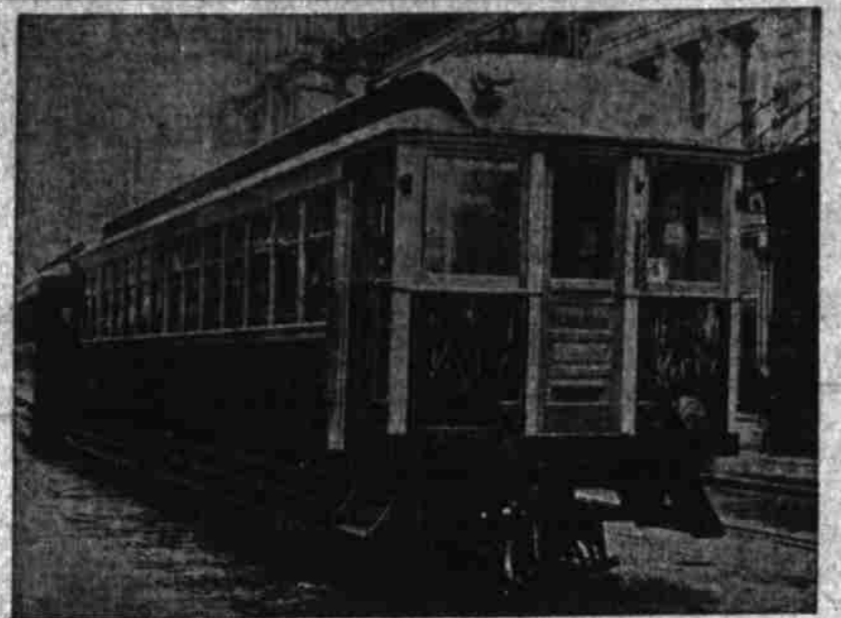

NEW TYPE OF CAR IN SERVICE



Car Has Door at Each End as Well as Usual Side Doors.

Two new vestibule cars have just been completed at the O. W. P. east side shops and put in commission on the Oregon City line. These cars are an exact counterpart of the largest and best cars on the O. W. P. lines except that there is a door in each end, in addition to the side door, which permits of the direct passage from one car to another. These cars were built as an experiment to be tried on the long suburban runs, on which trailers are carried, such as the line to Estacada, Oregon City and Leota.

If found practicable, it is probable that the company will build others of the same pattern in its own shops or contract with some street railway equipment company to supply the number needed.

DEMOCRATS ON SUPREME BENCH

Washington's New Direct Primary Law May Have This as One of Its Effects.

MAJORITY MAY FURNISH TOO MANY CANDIDATES

Peculiar Combination of Provisions Might Shut Ascendant Party Off General Election Ballot Altogether—The Support Pledge.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., April 6.—Members of the state supreme court are known to be somewhat concerned over the discovery that the provisions of the new direct primary law make it more than likely that the Democratic party will hereafter have one or more members of the supreme court bench in this state. The new law provides for a separate judicial ticket at primary elections, to be non-partisan, names of candidates appearing without political designation. The second-choice provision is also eliminated.

In 1908 three members are to be chosen, to succeed Chief Justice H. E. Haney, and Justices Root and Crow. The names of all candidates will be on the ticket without party designation. The three receiving the highest vote will be nominated.

Primaries Really Elect.
Only the names of the three candidates thus nominated go on the ballot for the general election in November. This means that the judges will practically be elected at the September primaries. With only three candidates on the general election ballot it would of course be impossible to elect anyone in opposition.

So many Republican candidates are likely to appear as to divide the party vote at the primaries and result in the Democratic candidates receiving a plurality. This would leave the Republicans thus defeated off the November ballots. It is easy to see that the Democrats, by having not to exceed three candidates at the primaries are likely to elect one or two, unless the Republicans also unite on a few.

Senators Also Cut Out.
The new primary law likewise eliminates United States senators and members of the legislature from the second-choice provisions. The law provides that where there are four or more candidates of any party for one "state or congressional office" the voter shall designate both a first and second choice, but it excludes members of the legislature and superior courts, state senators and representatives from this provision. The balloting for United States senators at the September primaries is of course advisory only, the election actually being by the legislature.

The law provides that each candidate for the legislature may file with his declaration of candidacy a pledge to support his party's choice for United States senator. There will then be printed on the official ballot below the name of such candidate for the legislature the words, "pledged to vote for party choice for United States senator."

RULE FOR DELINQUENT TAXES IN WASHINGTON

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., April 6.—In answer to a question raised by the supreme court of Chelan county, Attorney-General Atkinson has decided that a certificate of delinquency can be foreclosed any time after three years following date of delinquency, whether held by the original or a subsequent purchaser. He says in part:

"The law provides that in case of a default by the first purchaser he shall forfeit his right to the property to a second purchaser. But what were the rights of the first purchaser under his certificate? We have seen that he had the right to foreclose his certificate at any time after the expiration of three years from the 31st of May of the year for which he had first paid taxes on such land. This right is therefore forfeited to the subsequent purchaser, and we therefore hold that where any purchaser of delinquent certificates suffers a subsequent tax to become delinquent and a subsequent certificate of delinquency to issue on the same property included in his certificate, such subsequent purchaser may foreclose his certificate at any time after the expiration of three years after the original date of delinquency or any tax included in the original certificate as redeemed by the subsequent purchaser."

For New State Road in Lewis.

Chelan, Wash., April 6.—State Highway Commissioner J. M. Snow, Engineers Grimm and Bechly and Contractor George Vergour of Tacoma are in eastern Lewis county on an inspection trip in connection with the new state road being built in the Cowlick valley.

CROKER TAKES HAND IN IRISH POLITICAL GAME

Former Tammany Boss Promises to Prevent Election of Englishman at Dublin.

(Journal Special Service.) Dublin, April 6.—William Redmond recently succeeded in uniting for the first time in history all of Ireland's parliamentary representatives in support of an Irish bill. That is a measure sanctioning the cultivation of tobacco in Ireland. But even the soothing influence of the weed divine has failed to maintain that happy state of affairs.

Because a Nationalist member blocked a local Belfast bill, dealing with stipendiary magistrates, the Ulster Unionist party, headed by their English leader, Walter Long, threatened to wreck the tobacco bill. And this despite the fact that the Ulster Unionist party had previously unanimously agreed to the bill in the interests of Ireland as a whole. That is how National interests are sacrificed in the game of petty party politics.

"The government has agreed to the bill with certain amendments," says Redmond, "and if the Orangemen will maintain their responsibility to wreck the tobacco bill, they will be with them of wrecking a measure which may prove of great industrial benefit to Ireland. It is the meanest and most stupid kind of dog in the manger policy, for there is no evidence to show that tobacco might not be cultivated profitably north of the Boyne in Ulster itself."

Long represents a Dublin constituency in which Richard Croker, the ex-Tammany boss, resides. He has undertaken to see to it that Long does not get elected again by Dublin voters.

"If he does," says Croker, "I will admit that I have forgotten all I ever learned about politics in New York."
