URGE LANE TO BE INDEPENDENT

Many Republicans Declare He Is Stronger Now Than Before Ultimatum to Democrats.

DESIRE REPETITION OF FEARLESS ADMINISTRATION

People Generally Now Think More of Present Mayor Than at Any Other Time—Faction of Democrats Has Really Helped Him.

Mayor Lane is being urged by prominent Democrats and Republicans as well to enter the lists after the primaries as an independent candidate for reelection. It is being asserted on every hand that practically 80 per cent of the members of the Democratic party of the city is back of him in the stand he has taken and will support him in any effort he may make for another term in the mayor's chair.

It seems to be the consensus of opinion among those who follow the political situation that the mayor is stronger with the people of the city today than

he ever was and that he will be assured of a stronger backing should he now decide to make the race than he could have been had Chairman Thomas and his small coterie of henchmen not taken the course which has been pursued by them.

Expressions of satisfaction are being heard on every hand commending the mayor on the stand he has taken, and praising the letter written by him which, apparently, caused the small faction practically to disintegrate against him. The mayor's letter is pointed to as a document of a fair and honest spirit and desire to do what is best for the city irrespective of creed or faction.

Already many prominent men have been urging Mayor Lane to become an independent candidate and have pledged him their hearty support. These men are arguing that the administration just closing has been a good one, that it has been honest and fearless. They therefore wish to see it continued for another two years.
