YEAR'S THIRD FLOOD SWELLS WILLAMETTE

Warm Rain Is Also Bringing in
Melted Snow—Four-Foot
Rise in a Day.

Eugene, Or., April 6.—A heavy rain that has fallen continuously from Friday evening till late tonight has caused the Willamette river to rise very rapidly. From a height of five feet Friday it rose to nine feet this evening and is rising rapidly tonight. It is feared that the third flood since the first of the year will occur. The rain in warm and melting the snow in the mountains, which had fallen deep for several weeks previous to the present rain. Creeks and sloughs surrounding Eugene are all out of their banks and spreading over considerable territory. Some damage to farm property is reported.

RAILROADS WILL CLEAN CARS IF THEY WANT TO

Baltimore, Or., April 6.—Attorney General Crawford today rendered an opinion holding that the powers of the board of health relative to compelling railroads to properly disinfect or cleanse passenger cars have not been increased by the new quarantine law enacted at the last session of the legislature. The board of health is authorized to hold an inspection when there is danger of introducing contagious or infectious diseases into the state, but cannot compel railroads to cleanse unless they have made a personal investigation. The opinion was given on inquiry from Robert Tanneley, the state health officer, asking as to the power of the state board of health under either the state health laws or the quarantine act, relative to the disinfection of passenger cars of railroad companies.

JURY IN WARNER CASE HAS DISAGREED

Pendleton, Or., April 6.—The jury in the Mabel Warner case reported a disagreement at 3:30 this afternoon and was dismissed by Judge Bean. The jury stood nine for conviction and three for acquittal. It had been out since 10:30 Friday night. The case was that wherein Mabel Young Warner was accused of having forged a will whereby she became principal heiress to an estate valued at \$40,000 which was left by the death of J. W. Young, an old time resident of Weston. There were many sensational features in the trial, which lasted a week.

SEATTLE SPIRIT TAKES BALLARD INTO THE FOLD

Seattle, Wash., April 6.—Ballard, a leading suburb of Seattle, at a special election today, voted to annex to this city immediately. The vote stood 998 for annexation to 874 against, or a majority of 124, obtained after two years of hard fighting which has affected all the elections and other doings of the suburban city during that time. It will bring into Seattle a suburb with a population aggregating almost 20,000 and the largest shingle manufacturing city in the United States. The streets are almost all paved and excellent water, lighting and sewer systems exist.

SENATOR HEYBURN DELL STRIKES SERIOUSLY SICK AT ROOSEVELT

Idaho Statesman Unable to
Speak at Banquet—Family
Summoned to Bedside.

Former Governor Roasts Presi-
dent to Crowd of Newspaper
Men in New York.

Philadelphia, Pa., April 6.—United States Senator Weldon B. Heyburn of Idaho, who arrived in this city yesterday to speak at the banquet of the Young Republicans at the Bellevue

New York, April 6.—Governor Odell at the Grillers club tonight at a banquet gave another boost to the anti-Roosevelt fight. Odell spoke in enigmata, characterizing some one, unmistakably the president as a "brain-slurper" within the boundaries of his own egoism.

He asked for "a simple man in preference to a man whose constant hankering after power and pelf has distorted his imagination and led him to the belief that his honesty is the only sin-pure article, and that all other members of society are cheats, frauds and liars."

Addressing the newspaper men present, Odell said:

"Do not lose yourselves in admiration of men high in power, of seeming intelligence, but who are demagogues with a case of paranoia. The 'brain-slurpers' in high places are demoralizing."

Three Months Dead,
High Up on Rainier

Bodies of Three Miners Found
Congealed Amid Wreck
of Cabin.

Tacoma, Wash., April 6.—Three men had their lives snapped out in a lonely cabin in Glacier basin at the head of White river, on the north slope of Mount Rainier, three months ago. W. C. Berg, secretary of the Mount Rainier Mining company, brought the news here today and Coroner Stewart is looking the matter up. The names of the dead are:

Ernest Shaler, aged 40, of Buckley, Nola Brown, aged 31, of Seattle, and Alfred Franklin, of Norman, near Everett, aged 15.

The first known of the tragedy was when two men sent out by the company the first of the week reached Glacier basin. They had great difficulty in locating the cabin and when at last they found it, it was a mass of ruins covered with snow and ice.

Coroner Stewart believes it was wrecked by a terrific windstorm while the inmates were asleep and then covered with a snow alip. The bodies were in a perfect state of preservation, being frozen stiff. From the amount of supplies left it is thought the cabin was wrecked early in January. The body of a boy was pinned to the earth beneath a beam and the bodies of the men were found close by. The three were sent out by the company early last fall to do development work during the winter on a copper property.

Another party of men has been sent to Glacier basin to get the bodies, which will be carried 50 miles over a rough mountain trail to Buckley and shipped to their homes from there.

LITTLE HORACE MARVIN KIDNAPED OR MURDERED

YOUNG JOHN D. WILL BE HIS FATHER'S OVERSEER

Tarrytown, N. Y., April 6.—John D. Rockefeller Jr. is going to be the new superintendent of Rockwood, his father's country estate at Tarrytown. The report is that C. V. Hemenway, for many years the superintendent, will resign on April 15 and young Rockefeller will assume charge. Only two weeks ago he resigned from his Sunday school class because of poor health.

The new position will give him plenty of outdoor exercise and should be a great help in rebuilding his constitution. He will have charge of about 200 men, mostly Italians, and an estate of over 4,000 acres. He will oversee all work, propose new improvements and will particularly be interested in the erection of his father's new mansion.

As he will have to deal mostly with Italians Mr. Rockefeller is busy studying the language and at present he can understand many words. He intends to spend the summer here and will be out of doors all the time. He will have plenty to do for himself and his father. He expects a strenuous life and is delighted over the prospect.

ASSURES SPEEDY TRIAL OF MAYORALTY CASE

New York, April 6.—"He is charged with the usurpation of a public office. That is the sole question to be determined in the first instance and his interest ceases when it is determined. Thus did Justice O'Gorman today sweep away the last pretext for delay left to 'Mayor' George B. McClellan, who has been stubbornly resisting the recount of the votes cast in the mayoralty election of 1905, a majority of which are believed to be for William R. Hearst."

Then, in a learned opinion which cited a number of previous cases, Justice O'Gorman overruled the demurrer filed by McClellan's attorneys asking that the summons and complaint in the suit brought by Attorney General Jackson be set aside.

The decision removes the last barrier to the speedy trial of the case on its merits unless the "mayor" in the interest of delay, makes another hopeless appeal to the appellate division.

HALF MILLION FIRE RAGES IN NEW YORK

New York, April 6.—A fire which, if it had started 10 minutes earlier, would have undoubtedly been attended with fatal results, partially destroyed the buildings numbers 71 to 77 Light street and 41 to 141 Washington street, occupied by the Union Pacific Tea company.

The loss was \$500,000. Business had been suspended 10 minutes before the fire began and were it not for this fact it is likely that the hundreds of employees would have had their escape cut off from the flames and a number would either have been killed or injured.

COASTER BOILER ROOMS MUST BE ALL UNION

Seattle, Wash., April 6.—The marine firemen's organization has served notice that all men working in the boiler rooms of steamships operating on the coast must belong to their union. This will bring the coal passers and water tenders into the marine firemen's organization. It is insisted by the firemen that they are responsible for the boiler room and they cannot be so long as men are under firemen over whom firemen have no jurisdiction. The demand of the firemen has been submitted to other labor organizations in the steamship trades and the new arrangement will go into effect at once.

STORM AT M'MINNVILLE ONE OF SEASON'S WORST

NEBRASKA BREAKS RECORD FOR REFORM LEGISLATION

Anti-Lobby, Anti-Pass, Pure Food Law, Child Labor Laws Among Measures Passed.

Lincoln, Neb., April 5.—The thirtieth session of the Nebraska legislature, which has just adjourned, probably broke all records in the amount of reform legislation enacted. The "Square Deal" measures passed and signed by the governor include an anti-pass law, a two-cent passenger rate law, a maximum freight rate law, a direct primary law, a law reducing express charges, a law reducing charges made by stock

yards commission merchants, a law prohibiting bucket shops from doing business in the state, an anti-lobby law, a pure food law, a child labor law, a terminal taxation law, an employers' liability law, a law putting breweries out of the saloon business, a law making it illegal to employ night railroad telegraph operators or townsmen under 21 years of age, a reciprocal demurrage law, a law creating the recently elected railway commission and a large number of minor statutes affecting the operations of corporations.

The anti-pass law prohibits everybody from riding free except railway employees and their families, caretakers of livestock and lawyers and doctors who give a major portion of their time to the railroad work. The 2-cent law provides a flat rate of 2 cents a mile no matter whether the rate is compensatory or not. The primary law provides for the "closed" or party primary.

JAP WOMEN MARRIED ABOARD SHINANO MARU

Seattle, Wash., April 6.—A dozen Japanese women coming here, ostensibly for the purpose, have been married aboard the Shinano Maru, on which they arrived yesterday. When the women left Japan it was with the object of meeting and marrying men of their native country who are in America. Before they could land, however, according to the orders of the immigration officials, they had to be married after the American custom. The lines of the steamer had hardly been laid before the Japanese appeared and, clamoring aboard, were united in marriage. The last of the dozen were claimed this evening.

Perhaps after a few hundred more immigrants are found by Hone's grand jury there may be a conviction or two, but not for a long time yet.
