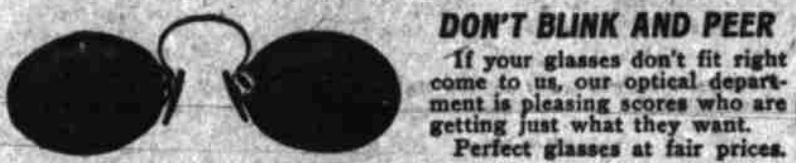

BRYCE SPEAKS ON OWNERSHIP

English Ambassador Tells What Public Ownership in England Has Proved.

NO BOODLING PROVED AGAINST OFFICIALS

Bryce Declares There Has Been Neither Grafting Nor Abuse of Patronage by Municipal Ownership Officials, and None Charged.

Chicago, April 6.—James Bryce, the newly appointed ambassador from Great Britain to the United States, author of the "American Commonwealth" and the first commoner to represent the court of St. James at Washington, after expressly disclaiming any intention to give America advice on municipal ownership, tonight presented strong arguments for the adoption of the London scheme of public ownership. Mr. Bryce spoke at a banquet given in his honor by the Chicago Commercial club at the Auditorium hotel. One hundred and seventy civic leaders listened to the speaker.

"One might extend indefinitely the list of benefits authority might provide if it were to consider itself a benevolent parent, but in Britain at least there has been little disposition to go far in this direction. Glasgow has succeeded with public lodging-houses. Other things, until recently regarded as luxuries, it is contending ought to be provided. Playgrounds for children, open spaces, public parks, open-air music, concerts and even theatres are suggested.

Some Monopolies Necessary.
"The question of immense importance which has arisen is whether public utilities should be operated by joint stock corporations or by publicly appointed boards. The supply of water is a monopoly. You cannot have a number of companies supplying water to citizens any more than you can have rival streetcar companies laying rails in the same streets.

"The same is true of lighting. Where there is a monopoly, it is urged in England that the profit and increased value.

PATROLMEN UNABLE TO KEEP IN TOUCH WITH THEIR CAPTAINS

An absolute state of chaos exists in the police alarm telegraph system and nearly one-half of the patrol boxes and telephones on both sides of the river are out of commission, thereby making it impossible for the majority of patrolmen on the three reliefs either to call the station in a case of emergency or to make their hourly reports. The demoralized condition of the patrol box system has been prevalent for over two weeks and has been the cause of much unfavorable comment in police circles. Superintendent Savariua of the police and fire alarm systems, is apparently at sea and unable to cope with the situation. Under Savariua's directions a solitary policeman has endeavored to locate the difficulty but without success and Savariua upon making a personal investigation, also met with failure.

KEEN-EYED DETECTIVES ABLE TO FIND A FANTAN RESORT

Despite the fact that the annual exclusion of the Chinese coolies to the canneries has been under way for over two weeks yet there are apparently enough Mongolians left in Chinatown to still make fantan a profitable pastime for the boss gamblers. Detectives Kay and Klenin in passing the resort at 1304 Second street yesterday afternoon noticed that the signal announcing gambling was in the front door. About the time the two officers put in an appearance a Chinaman happened to come out of the

place and the policemen seized the opportunity of rushing through the doorway.

The inside barriade was quickly demolished with a sledge hammer and the gambling room nine Chinese were found congregated around the table. The beans and other paraphernalia had been secreted but two Celestials hiding in a rear room were found in possession of \$127 in cash. All of those arrested were released on deposit of \$25 cash bail apiece and the cases will be heard in the police court tomorrow.

In conjunction with Mr. Bristol, Assistant United States District Attorney James Cole has been working night and day in the preparation of the cases which he will present to the grand jury. Mr. Cole will have charge of all the indictments to be returned against the famous postoffice and counterfeiting gangs. It is realized that included among the men arrested for these offenses are desperate criminals, nearly all of whom have served several terms in the penitentiary, and who will be prepared to dodge every point of the law their knowledge will enable them. It is chiefly in the indictments to be returned against violators of the land laws that the interest of Portland citizens turns, and it is rumored that none will be disappointed by the developments of the investigations.

Rome, April 6.—Another step in the canonization of Pope Pius IX was taken today when Bishop Baldassari of Imola made his report to Pope Pius X and Cardinal Merry del Val, the papal secretary of state, on the miracles attributed to the late Pope Pius IX, who was bishop of Imola before he was elected pope.
