Portland Lads Capture One-sided Contest in the Interscholastic League.

EAST SIDE NINE NO MATCH FOR THE P. A.

Gray Was in Good Trim and Pitched Rings Around His Opponents. While Hill and Thorburn Were Slow in Locating the Plate.

In the second game of the season of the interscholastic baseball league yesterday Portland academy overwhelmingly defeated the East Side high school by the score of 20 to 3. The result of the game was never in doubt, although up to the fifth inning the academy boys maintained only a 3 to 1 lead. In the sixth inning four bases on balls, a couple of passed balls and errors, coupled with four safe bingles, netted the academy 10 runs. In the seventh five were added. The high school boys were outclassed at every stage of the game. Free passes were frequent and P. A. stole bases at will. The game was slightly marred by wild throwing, both sides showing lack of practice in this respect. Several star players on both teams were barred out by their faculties for poor scholarship, but this had no bearing on the result. Gray, for the academy, pitched a steady game, and although he issued six passes, allowed only three hits. The high school twirlers were touched up for 13 safe aways.
