The Giants Put Up a Stirring Contest and Beat Out the Seals.

GROOM PITCHED HIGH GRADE ARTICLE OF BALL

In First Half of the Final Inning McCredie Walked, Stole Second and Took a Daring Chance and Made Home With Winning Run.

(Journal Special Service.) San Francisco, April 12.—The Portland ball club took a pass yesterday and succeeded in defeating the Seals 2 to 1 after a long 12-inning contest. San Francisco's only run was made in the first inning, though several times thereafter, especially in the last inning, the bases were bulging with anxious Seals. Groom was on the firing line for the visitors and pitched a star game. He had perfect control and was cool even in the tightest situations. Portland tied the score in the sixth inning and it remained tied up until McCredie scored the winning run in the twelfth. There was one man out when McCredie drew a base on balls. He was bold and stole second. Newman flew out. Stator shot one at Charlie Irwin's toes and the ball took a peculiar bounce into the air, rolling towards left field. Before Hildebrand could return the ball, McCredie had taken a good chance and scored, sliding in under Esola. SALEM BASEBALL LEAGUE HAS BEEN ORGANIZED

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., April 12.—Local baseball enthusiasts met at the Y. M. C. A. building last evening and organized the Salem baseball league which will be composed of four aggregations, the Y. M. C. A., the Woolen Mills, the Fairmounts and the Merchants. The executive committee will meet in a day or so and will make definite arrangements to obtain and lease a tract for a baseball park. The officers of the league are: President, Hon. T. E. Key; secretary, C. F. Bester of the Y. M. C. A.; treasurer, J. G. Graham. A committee on arbitration consisting of W. H. Eldridge, J. D. Sutherland and George Eyrer whose duties will be to settle all disputes arising among the teams was also chosen. Each team will have the right to sign 15 players whose standing will have to be passed upon by the board on arbitration before they are allowed to play.

The Rules of the League.

Each team shall furnish their own suits, gloves, masks and protectors. Each team shall, at the beginning of each game, in which it plays, furnish an umpire with a regulation ball in good condition, said ball to be returned to the team at the end of the game, provided it be not lost or stolen.

Each team shall play at the same time and place assigned them by the committee.

The committee shall also furnish an umpire and official scorer for each game.

The use of profane, abusive or indecent language on the part of the player will be cause for disqualification from that game or, at the discretion of the committee, from all future games.

All teams playing registered, player forfeits his right to play in future games.

In all other respects the Spaulding official rules for 1907 shall govern.
