FOR A PUBLIC HALL IN SUBURB
Sellwood Organizations Getting Together to Plan its Construction.

MEETING PLACES AT PREMIUM AT PRESENT
Believed Financial Benefit Will Justify the Erection of Such a Building as There is a Constant Demand for It.

A movement has been started by the Sellwood board of trade by which a joint building will be erected for the use of several organizations in that suburb. Nothing definite regarding the building has been determined upon, the movement only being launched at the last meeting of the board of trade. It has been talked of by the citizens of the community for some time. The cost of the building is estimated variously from \$10,000 to \$25,000. The organizations that will erect this building together are the Sellwood branch of the Y. M. C. A., Sellwood branch of the Library association, United Artists, Foresters, Volunteer Firemen's association, Sellwood board of trade, and possibly the Masons. The Y. M. C. A., United Artists and Firemen have purchased lots already for building, and the organizations are all well founded financially. Architect Frank Gibson has prepared outlines of the plans, and thinks that a suitable building cannot be erected for much less than \$20,000. Representatives of these different orders and associations were present at the last meeting of the board of trade, and all spoke enthusiastically for the joint building. It is thought that the project will yield an income on account of the demand for such a structure in the suburb, since the city has remedied the old fire hall there is no place for the people to assemble. Following is the committee appointed to investigate the enterprise: Sellwood branch of the Y. M. C. A., Dr. A. W. Webster; Firemen's association, G. H. Walker; Library association, Rev. D. A. Thompson; United Artists, Charles Turley; Foresters, D. F. Heister and Sellwood board of trade, J. F. Kerchem. Councilman H. Williams, who has offered to donate \$100 at any time the committee would call for it.

FOR GUARANTEE OF MARITAL HAPPINESS
A. O. U. W. Supreme Master Advocates Examination of Those to be Married.

Farer and happier marriages through a law compelling a physical examination of prospective couples, was the theme of an address given by W. M. Narvis, supreme master of the A. O. U. W., at the Woodmen's temple last night. He said that he firmly believed if such a measure were adopted by legislative bodies that half of the present domestic trouble would be eliminated when men and women in the future entered into marital relations. Mr. Narvis spoke also of the work and membership of the A. O. U. W., and was followed by Grand Master Clark and Mrs. Briggs, supreme chief. A brief review of the benefits accruing from participation in the lodge's work urged the members to increase the membership. Over 5,000 members belong to the A. O. U. W. in the Oregon jurisdiction, which is the home of 104 lodges, the first of which came into existence in this state in 1875. The local lodges represented at the gathering last night included Hope No. 8, Crescent No. 10, Pacific No. 17, Portland 37, Eureka No. 125 and Upehuro No. 125.
