Howard, E. J. Demarest, Walter Demarest, John M. Demarest, Paul Conrad, Chapman Hyams, James Rat, C. W. Bredow, New Orleans; J. L. Shaw, Washington, D. C.; R. K. Thompson, E. L. Penac, Lewis E. Graham, Mobile, Alabama; General W. L. Gabbell, former Confederate general, Dallas, Texas; H. W. Henderson, W. C. Henderson, Brooklyn, New York; William F. Johnson, Cincinnati; and P. D. Fitzpatrick, Boston.

DAUGHTERS OF AMERICAN REVOLUTION IN QUARREL

Charges That Society's Funds Are in Bad Condition Made and Denied Emphatically.

(Published Press by Special Licensed Wires.) Washington, April 13.—A "revolution" has broken out among the delegates to the congress of the Daughters of the American Revolution which will begin a week's session Monday. Charges that the finances of the society are in a bad condition and that a heavy debt hangs over it because of the depreciating stocks and bonds, which charges have been made by a number of delegates, have met with an emphatic disclaimer. The president-general, Mrs. Donald McLean, Mrs. Robert Parke, Mrs. Richard J. Barker and Mrs. William Kerfoot, vice presidents-general respectively of Georgia, Rhode Island and New Jersey; and Mrs. Patton, state regent of Pennsylvania, led in a denunciation of the charges at a meeting of the national board this afternoon. It is declared that the motion to endorse the action of the finance committee was carried unanimously. It is understood that the fight will be carried into the floor of the congress and that it will be used in the contest for president-general.

NO EIGHT-HOUR DAY FOR IRON MOLDERS

Seattle, Wash., April 13.—The Founders' association of the Puget Sound district, comprising practically all the founders of the Pacific northwest, has refused to grant the demand of the iron molders' union of the coast for an eight-hour day effective May 1. The announcement has been posted in the various foundries of Seattle and other cities of the Pacific northwest. Because of the fact that the wage schedule paid here, \$4 a day, is the highest in the United States, the employers hold that to grant the eight-hour day would be suicidal.
