ALONG THE WATERFRONT

The steamer Roanoke is due to arrive
at Astoria yesterday afternoon. She
chartered the schooner Sallor Boy to
load lumber for the same destination.

The American bark Louisiana arrived
at Astoria yesterday afternoon. She
probably commences loading Monday.
This morning she began taking some
timbers that had been towed alongside
from one of the mills. Of late only
small timber shipments have been sent
on the regular line because of the
heavy demand for the freight space for
four and miscellaneous cargo.

The steamer Costa Rica, Captain
Mason, sails for San Francisco tomorrow
morning.
Bids will be opened this afternoon by
Captain Werlich, inspector for the
annual supply of provisions and fuel for
the light stations in the thirteenth
district, comprising Oregon, Washington
and Alaska.

The Norwegian steamer Norman Isles
is due to arrive in the Columbia today
from San Francisco.
The Norwegian steamer Hordelund will
leave Monday for Nainimo, A. C., to
load coal for San Francisco. She will
sign nine sailors here.

The Norwegian steamer Terje Viken

The stern-wheel steamer Telegraph will
be lifted Monday for painting.

RUSSIAN IMMIGRANTS
INCREASED IN NUMBERS
Fifty Thousand More This Year
Than Last Settle in West-
ern States.

St. Petersburg, April 20.—The director
of the immigration department says:
"This year, owing to the political and
economic crisis, 300,000 Russian
subjects will emigrate to America. Hitherto
the yearly exodus has been about
250,000, of whom two-thirds were Jews
and only 53 per cent being farm hands. Now
the percentage of Russians and farm
hands has increased.

Most of the emigrants will go west
to Illinois, Minnesota and the Dakotas.
They come from Volga, Dnieper and the
Don districts, and are hardy and industrious.
Though illiterate, they are intelligent
and unbigoted. The government is
endeavoring to direct the stream of
emigration to Siberia, but only the poorest
people go there, the wealthier preferring
America. The steamship lines
from Libau, Odessa and Helmsingfors
make passage across the Atlantic cheaper,
easier and surer than to Siberia,
while better steamship agents canvass
the villages and hamlets securing the
desirable emigrants."

KILLS HUSBAND BECAUSE
BED COVERS WERE THIN
Waco, Tex., April 20.—Because the
bed covers were so thin and the night
cold, John Ford and his wife quarreled
last night. This morning Ford's dead
body was found in the street, his head
having been crushed in by an ax. The
wife was arrested and charged with the
crime.

HILL MAY SELL LINER
MINNESOTA TO JAPS
Chicago, April 20.—Traffic officials of
the Burlington road report a revival of
Oriental traffic. Since the cessation of
the war between Russia and Japan there
had been a marked falling off in traffic,
but the turn seems now to be assured.
The traffic is now considerably greater
than it was before the war began. The
demand for American cotton by the people
of the Orient appears to be increasing
at a greater rate than that for any
other commodity. Hill will try to
arrange a good working traffic agreement
with the Japanese line for transcontinental
roads, and it is believed this can be
more economically carried out than
an independent line can be operated. As
a part of the arrangement the Minnesota
may ultimately be sold to the Japanese
line.
