seekers who are coming from the middle west to Oregon usually have more or less ready money, enough to make a beginning in the new home. The aggregate of their investments is a great help to the rural communities of the state.

"Of 5,000 names furnished by the Oregon Development league, The Dalles got 750 replies to literature sent out," said A. Bennett of The Dalles Optimist, who was a Portland visitor yesterday. "Thousands of people in the east are looking toward Oregon this year and a large percentage of them are corresponding with some Oregon commercial organization with a view to visiting the state on the next colonist movement."

Railroads in Bad Odor.
The local financial market is easy for small investors, notwithstanding the fact that the banks have tightened their lines somewhat during the last few weeks. Money is plentiful for investment in everything, excepting only railroad securities. Trust companies are looking forward to legitimate openings for railroad construction, and for the operation of railroads at a profit, the policy of certain railroad presidents in using their positions to make illegitimate profits in Wall street has incited the sharp antagonism of the public, and railroad securities are in very bad odor in the west.

It is believed this feeling will wear off within the next few months, unless Harriman cuts another refunding melon in the face of the government's determination to keep railroad stocks and bonds down to something like a legitimate basis.

Banks Growing Rapidly.
Portland banks are said to be in the best condition ever known since the city became a banking center. Many of them are improving their quarters or planning to secure new homes. The Security Savings & Trust company is looking forward to installation in the new Corbett building at the corner of Fifth and Morrison streets within the next three or four months. The Merchants' Investment & Trust company held its annual meeting this week and changed its name to the Merchants' Savings & Trust company.

The bank has taken a long lease on the building at the corner of Fifth and Morrison streets, and will remodel and make it a five-story building. The bank will have, by the width of Sixth street, the furthest uptown location of any bank in the city, its closest competitor being the Oregon Savings & Trust company, on the opposite corner.

Prosperity Plainly Shown.
The Merchants' National bank has leased for a 12-year period the building at the corner of Fifth and Morrison streets, and will remodel and make it a five-story building. The bank will have, by the width of Sixth street, the furthest uptown location of any bank in the city, its closest competitor being the Oregon Savings & Trust company, on the opposite corner.

The Title Guarantee & Trust company celebrated its twentieth anniversary April 18. A beautiful illustrated booklet was issued, giving a history of the bank and figures showing its marvelous growth. In less than two years the deposits in its savings department have jumped from \$100,000 to \$1,500,000. The bank, in its new location in the Commercial building, has 12,000 square feet of office floor space, accommodating 45 desks and 35 employees. CAUGHT BAD MAN OFF HIS GUARD

Details of Clever Capture of Outlaw Bush at Myrtle Point—His Career.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Rooseburg, Or., April 20.—Joseph S. Bush, the alleged all-around outlaw and train-robbler, arrested at Myrtle Point by Deputy Sheriff B. Fenton and Detective Joseph McHugh, was brought to this city on the Myrtle Point stage by the officers and lodged in the county jail here, later proceeding to Portland to await the action of Governor Chauncey J. Robinson, who has permitted the detective to proceed with the prisoner to Girard, Kansas, where he is wanted for train robbery and murder. On the night of March 4, Bush held up the Missouri Pacific train at Pittsburg, Kansas, and killed John Henry, after which his partner, who was captured and is now in jail at Girard, robbed the passengers, securing about \$100 in money, and about \$1,000 worth of personal effects. Bush made good his escape.

The man under arrest has been in Coos county for about a month as a common laborer. He quietly stood on the street and Fenton approached him in a casual manner and had the handcuffs on him before he realized what was going on, after which he made a desperate attempt to escape, but Fenton soon overpowered him and with the assistance of Detective McHugh landed him in jail.

Bush's Career of Crime.
Bush's career of crime, so far as known, began over two years ago, when he deserted the United States army at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. Since that time he has held up over 50 saloons and stores and terrorized the citizens of two counties in Kansas.

The prisoner was apparently preparing to begin another reign of terror in Coos county, having placed an order for a Colt's automatic revolver with one of the Myrtle Point hardware dealers. Detective McHugh of the Missouri Pacific company says that within a few days after he had properly armed himself both Coos and Douglas counties would have been besieged by this outlaw. He was recognized here as having been on the streets of Roseburg not over a month ago. He is a stout man, about six feet in height, and is cool and nervy. He is only 24 years of age.

Albany Starts Something Little in Advance on the Clean-up Line.

Albany, Or., April 20.—Albany has had a clean-up day. Yesterday, in accordance with the proclamation of the mayor, the citizens generally cleaned the streets in front of their respective properties and assisted in clearing away the unsightly debris collected at various places. The business men have inaugurated a movement to sweep the entire length of First street each Monday, and this will be a weekly clean-up day.

The banks took a half holiday and the public schools and the college dismissed classes in the afternoon to enable the student bodies to participate. Old fences are being removed and great attention is given to the lawns and streets. Albany has awakened to the necessity of making this one of the most attractive and possibly the most beautiful city in the valley. Civic pride is being engendered, and with its cultivation the city will take on new life and the general appearance of the streets and alleys materially improved.

It is worthy of notice that these clean-up affairs are contagious, and whenever one party in a neighborhood leads the way others generally follow.
