Bridge Will Be Built From the Pretty Little Island to the Mainland and Launch Will Ply From the City.

Extensive preparations are now going on for the opening of the Rock Island Country club, May 15. The affair will be one long to be remembered, judging from the manner in which those having the matter in hand are prosecuting the work. In the first place, the grounds will be in much better shape than last season, and then the membership will be fully twice as large. Secretary O. Railroad Folders and Books on European Travel Are at the Library.

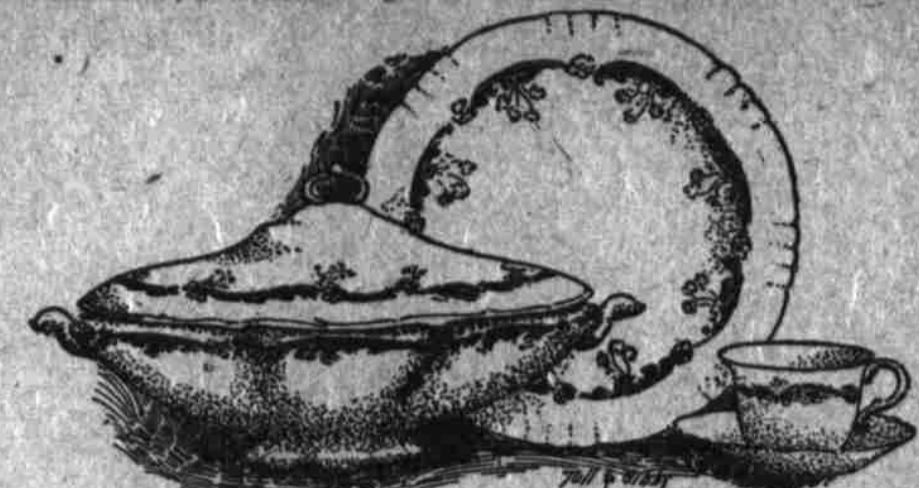

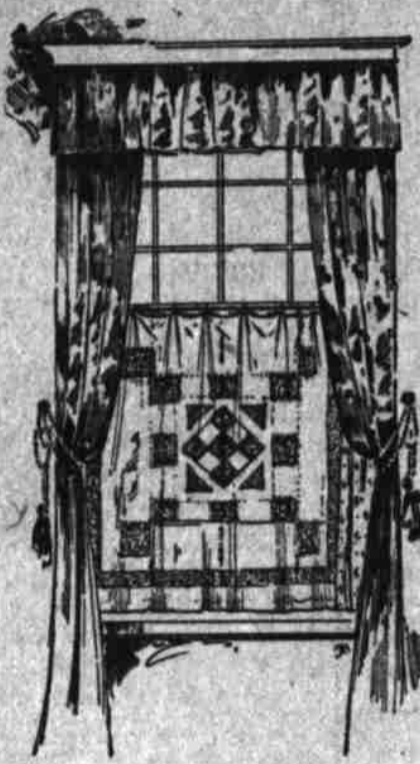
Jones, M. C.—European Travel for Women, 1900. List of books given, preliminary reading, works of art, and books relating to certain periods. Contains very practical hints.

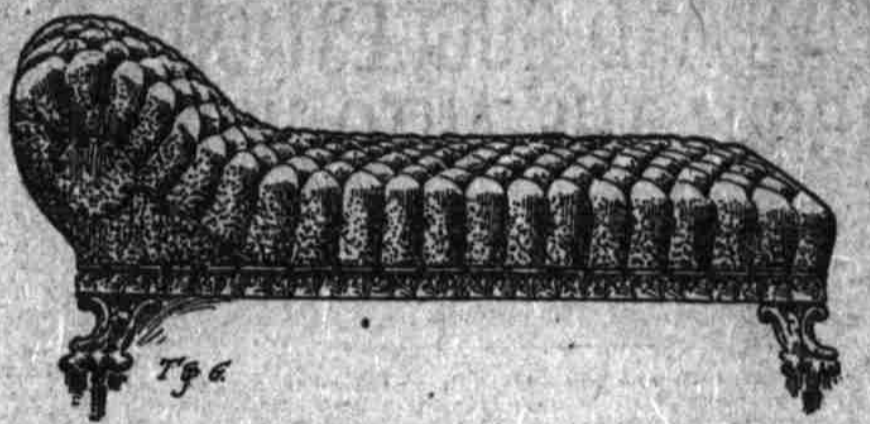

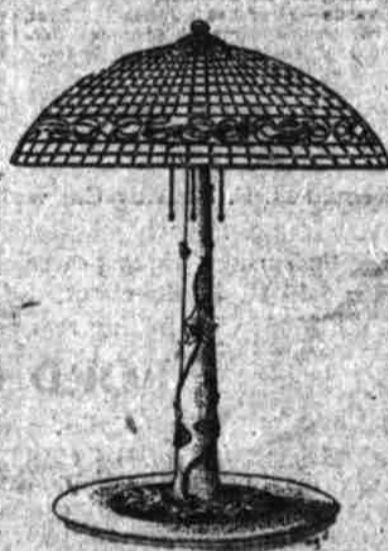

STONE QUARRY FACILITIES TO BE LARGELY INCREASED

Additional Machinery of Latest Pattern to Be Installed by Forest Grove Company. The Forest Grove Stone Quarry company has increased its capital stock by \$100,000, all of which is to be used in largely increasing the company's output of building stone. Orders for additional machinery have been placed and necessary track facilities will be provided for the output. Several Pitman saws will be installed, a diamond-tooth circular saw and the latest improved channelling machine. The Pitman saw is a comparatively recent invention, which does away with the old style

method of using sand and a stream of water for cutting, fine steel shot supplying the sand.

The Forest Grove quarry produces two excellent grades of building stone. One, when first quarried, is a dark blue changing after a short exposure to a grayish green. The other is a pale white, which has been pronounced to be equal in wearing qualities to the darker colored. The quarry lies about a mile from the Southern Pacific West Side line. It is the intention of the company to put in a spur track to the quarry and operate the plant on a much larger scale in future. The Forest Grove university was built of stone from the quarry and a handsome residence is soon to be erected in Holiday addition entirely of the white stone.
