

TRY TO KILL NEW DISTRICT

Eastern Oregon People Seek the Referendum on Creation of Eleventh District.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY CENTER OF OPPOSITION

Collier, Who Ran Against Judge Bradshaw of the Seventh District, is Opposed by the Grangers of Three Counties.

Opposition is particularly cutting the eleventh judicial district out of the territory of the seventh and is general to J. A. Collier, the recent appointee chosen to fill the place of the district attorney under the new law. It is responsible for the referendum being invoked on the bill creating the new district in eastern Oregon. Petitions providing for the application of the referendum to the measure have been received in Portland and are now being circulated. of Sherman, Wheeler and Gilliam counties will come to Portland and take personal charge of the task of securing the necessary signatures to the petitions. The new law was fathered during the last session of the legislature by Representative Pike of Wheeler, Sherman and Gilliam counties. It was in reality, however, the idea of Senator Jay Bowerman from the same district. The measure was referred to the delegations from the counties affected and went through the legislature on their recommendation, without discussion.

Much opposition developed, however, from the seventh district. Judge Bradshaw, the presiding judge, opposed the division strenuously for some time and interceded with various public officials, arguing that the formation of the additional district was unnecessary and would place a burden of taxation on the new district out of proportion with the good gained by its creation. After Judge Littlefield took office, however, Judge Bradshaw quit opposing the division.

The appointment of J. A. Collier to the office of district attorney was the last straw that broke the passive resistance of the residents of the new district. Collier was deputy district attorney under District Attorney Menefee of The Dalles, and in the last general election ran against Judge Bradshaw who was trying for reelection. The people of the seventh district while they like Mr. Collier personally are not to be satisfied with him as a district attorney.

As a result of the double contention the granges of the new district have undertaken to invoke the referendum and have raised some \$15,000 to assist in the work.

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RESIDENCE LOTS FIND NEW OWNERS

Building Sites Sell at Advanced Prices—Masons Plan East Side Lodge Structure.

Yesterday realty sales were confined mainly to residence and residence sites, no business property changed hands, and but two small acreage sales were reported.

John F. Buhmann purchased from A. L. Howard 125 feet on the southeast corner of Falling street and Cleveland avenue for \$4,000. A modern two-story residence will go up on the lot during the summer.

Henry Gerson, administrator, has sold to E. F. Loomis a lot on the corner of Clackamas and Benton streets, Lower Albina, for \$5,800.

The lot at the northeast corner of High and King streets, Woodstock, has been sold to L. T. Terry for \$3,000.

The southeast corner of Ross and Broadway has been purchased by H. J. Malheur from W. B. Bolton for \$5,000.

Florlan Pucha has purchased a house and lot on Willamette Heights for \$4,000. The property belonged to Montgomery Otis.

The east side Masonic lodges have agreed on a general plan for the proposed temple to be erected at East Burnside and East Eighth streets. It is proposed to build a two-story brick, with ornamental front and full concrete basement. The architect's plans will be finished this week and bids asked for at once.

BUYING HOOD RIVER LANDS FOR ORCHARDS

Portland Syndicate Makes Purchase of Over Six Hundred Acres.

A syndicate of Portland real estate dealers, composed of J. O. Rountree of Whiting & Rountree, E. J. Daly, J. Adrian Epping and C. T. Baker have purchased 641 acres of Hood River apple land and have already let contracts for clearing the entire tract and planting it in apple trees. They will set it in Spitznbergers and Newtons exclusively, the apples that made Hood River famous the world over.

In addition to the syndicate purchase Mr. Epping owns 80 acres, 10 acres of which is in full bearing, and from which he derived a net income last year of \$4,000. Mr. Rountree purchased 40 acres individually a few weeks ago, which he is having made ready for planting. E. J. Daly bought a quarter section near the syndicate purchase last fall, all of which will be set in apples next winter.

Within the past year a large amount of Portland money has gone into Hood River and White Salmon lands.
