Friends of Washington Congressman Question the Wisdom of a Toga Chase.

CAN HELP STATE MORE STAYING IN THE HOUSE

Rivers and Harbors Chairmanship His With Little Waiting—Direct Primary Might Put Him Out Entirely—Consider Ankeny Faction.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., April 22.—Friends of Congressman Wesley L. Jones at the state capital are by no means a unit in desiring him to be a candidate for the United States senate next year.

Some of them think it would be the biggest political mistake he could make, also that the interests of the state would suffer should Jones be taken out of the national house of representatives. They will all support Jones if he is a candidate for the senate, and they believe he can be elected; but they point out that if he quits the house it will be many years before he can be replaced there in position and influence, and a long time before he can become anything like as strong a factor in the senate as he is in the house.

They call attention especially to his position as a member of the rivers and harbors committee, which they assert is by far the most important committee in the national congress so far as the interests of the people of this state are concerned. In the last house there were only nine men above Jones on this committee. Several of those above him were defeated for reelection, which will put the Washington man considerably nearer the top in the congress which has already been elected.

Chairman of Committee in Time. Jones can, of course, remain in the house as long as he likes, and in a comparatively short time, his friends declare, he will be next to Chairman Theodore E. Burton himself, and if he remains a few years longer will become chairman of the rivers and harbors committee. They point to the present political death-struggle in Ohio between Foraker and Taft. Congressman Burton is involved as the manager of the

Taft campaign, and if he wins he will go to the senate as Foraker's successor. If Foraker wins, he will send a new man to the house to replace Burton, so that in any event the Cleveland congressman will be out of the house within a few years. It is estimated that if Jones had the chairmanship of this important committee, worthy projects in this state, including the navy-yard at Bremerton, would call for the expenditure of millions annually.

Direct Primary a Grave Danger. They also call attention to the direct primary situation, which might possibly result in taking Jones out of congress altogether. If he files his declaration for senator, he cannot be a candidate for the house, since no name can appear on the ballot in two places. While his friends profess to believe he could certainly be elected senator by the people, they admit, to themselves at least, that there is the certainty of that as of his candidacy for the lower house.

It is not believed the Piles organization could support Jones under present conditions. Piles himself has declared himself with the Ankeny candidacy, and that senator and his friends are said to be of the opinion that it would be a mistake to make any changes in the Washington delegation in congress at present.

The Bourne campaign in Oregon is pointed to as an instance of what can be accomplished by an organization and money under the direct primary system. Bourne was not a public speaker and had no public record which made him a natural candidate, but he built up a great organization in every precinct in Oregon and got a plurality for senator.

Advices to Jones. Friends of Jones also fear that he would be making a mistake by antagonizing the Piles-Ankeny organization at this time. They look upon this organization as the strongest political compact in the state, and realize that even as popular a man as Jones cannot sweep it off its feet in the centers of population, where votes will be rolled up in bunches under the direct primary. They argue that Jones, having been regarded as friendly to this organization in the past, will be the natural heir to its support in good time.

Attention is also called to the fact that considerable Jones senatorial sentiment is being worked up by candidates or their friends who desire to succeed Jones in congress. At least six men are said to have declared themselves candidates for congress in Jones' district already. It is not likely that any one of them would care to go into the campaign against Jones himself if he should decide to ask for that nomination. But each one of them believes he could win against the others. Since the recent legislative divided the state into congressional districts, the east side has become fertile ground for congressional candidates, if Congressmen Jones can only be induced to keep out of that race next year.

PRINCE AND PRINCESS OF WALES AT GLASGOW

INDIAN DIVORCE SUITS FOR TRIAL

South Dakota Court Has Twenty Indian Divorce Cases on Its Calendar.

BLANKETS AND PONIES IN LIEU OF ALIMONY

Infidelity, Desertion and Cruelty Charged by Red-Skinned Spouses—Dog Soldier Made Coffin for Sick Wife—Angry at Recovery.

(Journal Special Service.) Bonestell, S. D., April 22.—A glance at the calendar of the Gregory county circuit court, which convened for its regular term today, is sufficient to show that there is nothing in the popular belief that the red man is incapable of adopting the white man's ways. No fewer than 20 divorce cases are on the docket in which Indians are the principals. This is regarded as a good record, even in South Dakota. It is the first session of the court under the new law which abolished the Indian courts and required that all Indian cases shall be tried by whites.


The complaints would indicate that the Indians apparently have better reason for desiring that their marital bonds be severed than is oftentimes the case with their white brothers and sisters. For instance, James Ghost Walk wants a divorce from his wife, Bessie Ghost Walk, on the ground that she eloped with Walking Soldier. The facts in the case Ghost Walk expects to prove by Thomas Two Stocks and William Bear. The complainant also asks for the custody of his child, Mollie Three Thighs Ghost Walk.

A case in which the wife is the complainant is that of Alice Good Muskrat, who asks for a divorce from her husband, Henry, who is charged with eloping with Flora Walk as She Jump. The plaintiff wants her maiden name of Alice High Kicker restored. Another case is entitled Poor Man Star Boy vs. Jennie Star Boy. Poor Star Boy alleges that Jennie ran away from him four years ago and took up her abode with an Indian named Walking Thunder, with whom she is now living. His witnesses in the case will be Three Dogs, Kicks High and Three Moons.

Fonies Instead of Alimony. Kate Belt, after waiting three years for Anthony Belt to return, sued for a divorce and alimony in the shape of a slice of Anthony's land and some of his ponies and blankets. Mule Driver, High Kick and Walks Over will be the witnesses for the plaintiff.

Holy Truck wants a divorce from Never Stamped, who is alleged to have belted his name by stampeding with Anna Buffalo Pipe. White Holly, Three Tons and One Tall are expected to prove the facts alleged by Mrs. Holy Truck.

One of the most peculiar cases on the docket is that of Josephine Dog Soldier, who gives most novel reasons for desiring a divorce from her spouse. She declares that when she was sick
