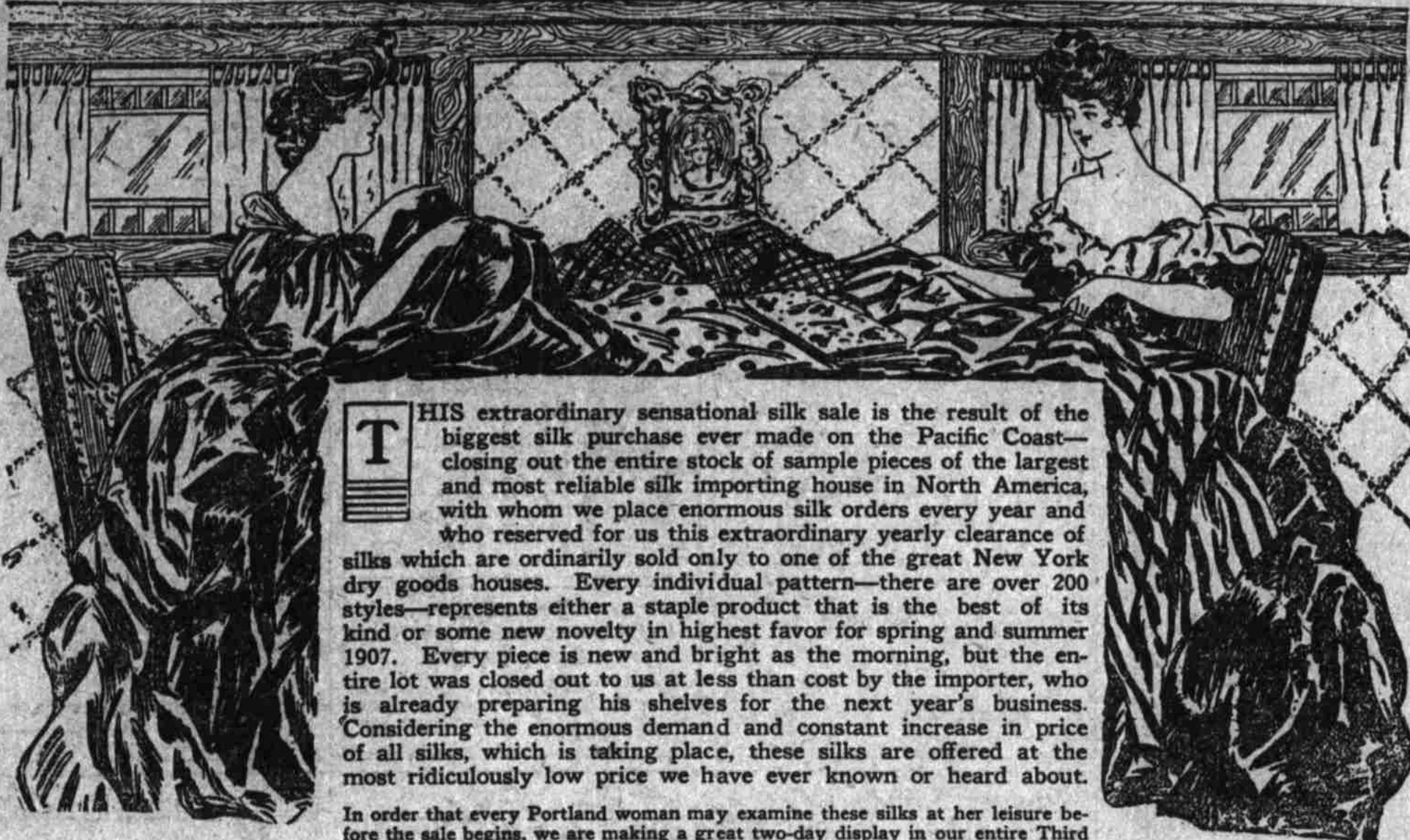

JACKSON REJOICES OVER LETTER FROM THEODORE

Chicago Labor Leader Has Had Long and Stormy Career—Began in Canada.

(Journal Special Service.) Chicago, April 25.—Honore Jackson, the Chicago barber and labor agitator, is rejoiced over the facing administered to him by President Roosevelt. Jackson's stormy career began in Regina, the territorial capital of the Canadian Northwest, in 1885, when the precursor, Louis Riel, the leader of the rebellion that was put down by General Middleton and Canadian troops, was executed. Jackson, who was captured at the battle of Batoche, broke jail at Upper Fort Garry and made for the United States. So did Gabriel Dumont and other half-

breeds, while Big Bear, Almighty Voice and other Indian chiefs were captured and sent to the rockpile in the Manitoba provincial prison at Stony Mountain.

When Jackson, who acted as secretary for Louis Riel's provisional government, as the rebel leaders styled themselves, landed over the boundary at Pembina, North Dakota, he was caught. But again his slippery instinct stood him in good stead and he got away from the guards. In the same year, after getting a card as a member of the Knights of Labor, he came to Chicago and established a system of slugging.

Insurance Companies' Object. Albany, N. Y., April 25.—At a joint meeting of the senate and assembly committees on insurance last night objections to pending legislation were urged by representatives of the New York Life, the Mutual and Equitable companies, the Insurance Presidents' association and International Policyholders' association. At the session charges and counter charges of fraud in the election of directors of the companies were made.

POISON CASE RECALLED BY DEATH OF DUNNING

War Correspondent, Husband of Mrs. Botkin's Victim, Passes Away in the East.

(Journal Special Service.) Dover, Del., April 25.—The funeral of John P. Dunning, the noted war correspondent, was held here yesterday. Dunning died last week in a Philadelphia hospital. His death recalls the celebrated Botkin poison case, one of the most remarkable criminal cases in the annals of the United States. He was buried by the side of the remains of his wife who was Mrs. Botkin's victim.

came that ended the Samoan difficulties in 1889 by the smashing of ships of the United States and Germany on the shores of Apia bay.

While in San Francisco Dunning met Mrs. Cordelia Botkin. A box of candy, alleged to have been poisoned, was sent from that city to Dover, Delaware, and received by Dunning's wife. She and her sister-in-law died and Mrs. Botkin was arrested. Three trials resulted disastrously for Mrs. Botkin. The first two juries found the woman guilty in the first degree and recommended a life sentence. The third verdict was "guilty in the first degree" without any mention of mercy. She was saved by the court of appeals and is now serving a life sentence.

After giving testimony at the first trial of the woman he believed had slain his wife Dunning went to Cuba and was with President Roosevelt's Rough Riders. He sent out the first story of the ambush of Las Guasimas, in which Hamilton Fish was killed. He had been in Philadelphia for the past three years.

STRANGE MAN BRUTALLY ASSAULTS A YOUNG BOY

Child Found Bound and Gagged in Cemetery by Gardener Hours Later.

(Journal Special Service.) Oakland, Cal., April 25.—Lured from home by a strange man, Towne Nyländer, a 10-year-old boy, who resides with his parents at 744 Ninth street, was abused and beaten in Evergreen cemetery beyond Fitchburg yesterday afternoon. He was found bound and gagged later by the gardener, who lifted the weak little body and carried it into his office.

While playing in front of the Lafayette school, a man about 35 years of age approached and asked in regard to

various parks in the neighborhood. He volunteered to give the boy 25 cents if he would show him about the cemetery grounds. The boy accepted, and in a secluded spot the man struck him several times and finally ended by tying both hands and feet.

When the boy called for help his assailant forced a gag into his mouth. Several hours later, when the gardener found him, he was in a weak and dazed condition. He cried piteously and begged his rescuer not to inform his parents of the plight in which he was found. The boy is still weak, but it is thought he will recover.

MASONS LAY CORNER STONE OF NEW TEMPLE
