## SUES WEINHARD ESTATE FOR VALUABLE TITLE

Millionaire Brewer Bid in Property at Sheriff's Sale Which Bickel Now Claims.

Frederick Bickel has filed suit in the circuit court to secure title to block 22 of the city of Portland, bounded by Ankeny, Ash, Second and Third streets. The title is now in the hands of the estate of the late Henry Weinhard. The property was formerly owned by Bickel, but was bid in at a sheriff's sale by Henry Weinhard in 1906. The millionaire brewer was a personal friend of Bickel and the latter alleges he promised to convey back the property when ever Bickel should raise the money to reimburse him for his outlay.

The amount paid by Weinhard was \$60,000 and Bickel says the property is now worth \$150,000. The executors of the Weinhard estate will contest the case.

## HERSHNER AGAIN PRINCIPAL AT LENTS
