

PICKEL ON ROCK PILE MAY CURE DIVORCE EVIL CALHOUN MEETS CARMEN'S UNION FEDERAL GRAND JURY EXPECTED TO RETURN INDICTMENTS SOON AGAINST POSTAL ROBBERS. Mrs. Cole Declared by Malarkey to Have Acted Indecorously in Courtroom. Insulted by Negro, Mother Claims Daughter Was Compelled to Leave.

The bad-husband-on-the-rockpile law is destined to operate as a palliative for the divorce evil, if a precedent set by Circuit Judge Frazer today is followed. Frazer refused to grant a divorce to Mrs. Elda A. Pickel this morning on the ground that the new law, which goes into effect on May 21, will serve as a more effective relief to the deserted woman than a divorce could.

United Railroads' President Holds Conference With Carmen—Denies Report of Sale.

San Francisco, April 26.—"I don't want a strike. There is no cause for a strike. I am willing to continue the high rate of wages now in force, the high wages paid Carmen anywhere in the United States. But I cannot go any farther than the wages fixed by the board of arbitration." This is the statement made by President Calhoun of the United Railroads.

Judge Beas ruled that the question as to character was too general to sustain the objection.
