

FREE PASSES GIVEN A SLAP

Woodlawn Residents Censure Councilmen Who Voted Against Abolition of Sinister Evil.

VAUGHN COMMENDED FOR HIS VIGOROUS STAND

Resolutions Adopted Handle Without Gloves Representatives in Council Who Are Accused of Accepting Petty Bribes From Railroads.

Resolutions censuring the 11 councilmen who voted against the ordinance prohibiting the acceptance of free passes from the railroad companies, were passed at a meeting held in Woodlawn last night under the auspices of the Woodlawn Improvement Association. Councilman Vaughn was highly commended for the stand he has taken on measures designed to protect the rights of the people against self-seeking corporations.

The resolutions were adopted practically by unanimous vote and are as follows:

Resolutions Are Oustic.
Whereas, the corrupt custom long prevailing among many of our city officials in accepting free transportation from railroads and other corporations is extremely unwholesome and injurious to the moral growth and prosperity of our municipality and commonwealth, and

Whereas, it is the purpose of the public corporations in offering free transportation to the city officials to influence said officials in voting upon questions in which the said corporations are interested, and

Whereas, the corporations are extremely particular that it be known that said passes are mere courtesies and not intended as a bribe, yet their conduct in defending the system of free transportation to city officials is evidence of the fact that such free transportation is given for the sole purpose of influencing the people's servants, and

Whereas, an ordinance was submitted to the city council of the city of Portland, prohibiting the acceptance of free passes by certain city officials, and

Whereas, 11 out of 15 councilmen voted against said ordinance;

Therefore, be it resolved, that we are unalterably opposed to the renomination and election of one and all of the 11 councilmen whose names are registered against the passage of the ordinance above indicated, prohibiting the use of free passes, and

Be it further resolved, that we hereby endorse the action of our councilman, W. T. Vaughn, in his untiring efforts in trying to pass this and other wholesome measures in the interest of the common people, and we further commend the action of those of the city council who stood by him in this and other fights which he has waged.

Kelshier Talks.
Dan Kelshier, candidate for mayor, was present and was very encouragingly received. He made a short address explaining what the east side could expect from him in the event of his election as mayor. The meeting was one of the most interesting and best attended of any held in Woodlawn.

H. G. Parsons, the candidate of the labor unions and of the North Progressive club on the peninsula, was present and made the first announcement of his declared himself ever to be opposed to the free pass evil and perpetual franchise and mentioned particularly the Fourth street franchise.

Lay New Water Main.
Dr. C. H. Rafferty was present and announced what had been determined by the water board for the new water main. A complete circuit by 12-inch and 8-inch mains will be laid from the new pipe line through Woodlawn, and he assured the residents they would have an abundance of hot water before the summer was over.

A committee was appointed to wait on the executive board to ask that the contracts for the grading streets of Woodlawn be fixed to the limit for not completing the work within the specified time. Water mains are soon to be laid and the streets will again be torn up. They have been improved all winter, having been partly graded and the ditches and the prospects are that they will be no better another winter.

WILL PROTEST AGAINST OFFICE CONSOLIDATION

Sellwood Residents Object to Having Postal Station Removed to Brooklyn.

The announcement that the Sellwood postal station is to be consolidated with a station at Brooklyn has aroused the residents of Sellwood who do not wish to be deprived of the privileges of a station at Sellwood. The Sellwood board of trade last night decided to enter a formal protest with the postal authorities regarding the removal of the station.

Dave M. Donough, president of the board of trade, expressed the opinion that the industrial importance of Sellwood demanded the continuance of the postal station. It is a great convenience to patrons who wish to get their mail Sunday and its removal is considered generally to be a backward step.

The committee that has been considering the proposal to build a joint club building in Sellwood for the uses of different beneficial institutions made its report which was adopted. A company with \$15,000 capital stock will be formed and each organization interested in the structure will be represented on the board of directors. The building is to be 100 by 100 feet and two stories high with the first floor slightly below the surface of the ground and a low upper floor.

The committee was continued and will go on with the incorporation and other plans. The building now is practically a certainty.

Promotions Will Also Be Made at Expiration of Year's Service.

The United States civil service commission has announced that an examination for clerk-carrier (male) will be held in this city on May 1, 1907. Clerks in offices of the first and second class and carriers in the city delivery service are divided into six
