

PENCE GETS COIN FOR MISSIONS

People of First Christian Church Give Over Fifteen Hundred Dollars.

ONE THOUSAND HAD LOOKED APPALLING

Industrial Promoter Makes First Appearance as Raiser of Money for Missions, but He Succeeds in Loosening Pursestrings.

Hon. Lafe Pence yesterday proved his gift as a money raiser at the First Christian church. It was the plan to raise \$1,000 for foreign missions, a burden that at first fairly made the members groan with its immensity, but after Mr. Pence had loosened his rhetorical gifts and conducted the actual means of raising the money, \$1,500 had been raised.

said he had raised money for Democratic conventions and raised money to buy suits for baseball clubs and several other things, but never before for foreign missions. "If I were to tell you," he said, "that I know of a field that we could buy with 400,000 barrels of oil in it I would not have to pass the first row in the state, so many of you would want to subscribe for stock in it; and I am here to tell you of a field where there are 400,000,000 of souls, and only 400 people to save one soul each.
