

# 20 GRADUATES OF SINGLE CHURCH MEDICAL COLLEGE FROM A TRIO

### Ex-Senator Gearin Delivers Address, Emphasizing Responsibility Upon Physicians.

### Congregational Pastors at Corvallis Will Discuss This Question Tomorrow.

### MEETING TODAY OF EAST WILLAMETTE ASSOCIATION

Many Topics of Greatest Moment on the Program, Chief Interest Centering in the Proposed Experiment in Church Union.

Before a host of friends and fellow students, 20 young men and women, members of the graduating class of the department of medicine of the University of Oregon, were presented with their diplomas and degrees in the assembly hall of the high school. Dr. F. L. Campbell, president of the university, conferred the degrees, and Dr. S. C. Joseph, dean of the medical faculty, handed each graduate a diploma. The hall was beautifully decorated. Floral emblems, class and college colors, with splendid music, enlivened the scene. Ex-Senator John M. Gearin made the principal address and spoke in a brilliant and forcible manner. He portrayed the wonderful strides made by the medical profession since early history and congratulated the young men and women upon the choice of life work they had taken up. He spoke earnestly and made the graduates feel that he, as well as the faculty and assembled friends, were in sympathy with them in the life that follows their college work. In closing he said:

**On Brink of Mysteries.**  
"These young men and women before us are of the great future. They are happy in the thought that their year's work is ended and well done. The world will be better for their lives and sacrifices to this noble calling. What has gone before takes us up to the brink of the great mysteries of the universe, beyond the world of knowledge lies before them, and they will bring all the wisdom of the past to bear on the knowledge of the present, and do their work well."  
President Campbell then conferred the degrees upon the graduates after a few words appropriate to the occasion. He was followed by Dr. George M. Wells, who presented the Saylor and anatomy medals to Carl Julius Hoffman.

After the presentation of medals, Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie delivered the charge to the graduates. Dr. Mackenzie clearly defined the work expected of the doctors, and feelingly pointed out the shoals and rocks from which they must steer. Dr. Mackenzie's address was one of the strongest ever made to a graduating class in Portland.  
Benjamin Louis Norden, valedictorian of the class, delivered a splendid valedictory on the science of the medical profession of the present day.  
The stage was banked with beautiful floral decorations. Members of the faculty sat in a semi-circle to the rear of the platform, while the graduates, in their black caps and gowns, were seated to the right of the speaker's stand. Konrad's orchestra furnished the music. The graduates are:

### GARFIELD EFFECTS BIG SAVING BY NEW ORDER

### Does Away With Custom of Having Employees' Expense Accounts Sworn to.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, D. C., April 30.—By a simple stroke of the pen Secretary Garfield has effected an annual saving of several thousand dollars in the interior department. He has signed a formal order which makes it no longer necessary for the employees of the department to have their signatures to traveling expense accounts acknowledged before a notary or other official empowered to administer oaths.

The just fees of the employees amount to several thousand dollars each year, and the inconvenience and loss of time entailed upon them probably costs the government as much more.

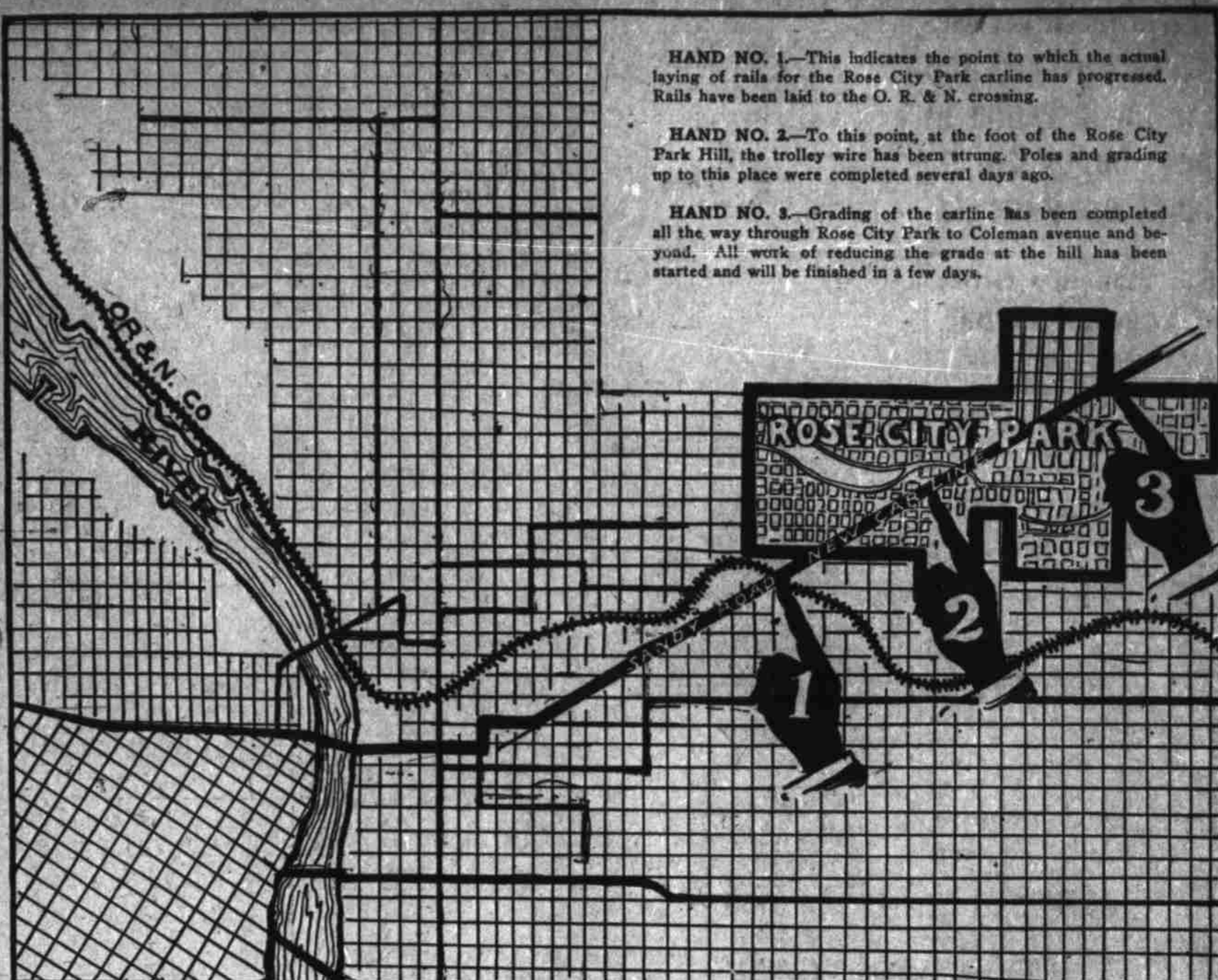
The order is in line with the new policy of the department for economy and efficiency in administration and eliminates a form of red tape which the secretary regards as unnecessary, although sanctioned by long observance in the past.

### SPOKANE'S PRIMARY MAY BE INVESTIGATED

Spokane, Wash., April 30.—Spokane's recent primary ballots may be investigated. It is claimed by the Republicans that there were many illegal votes cast at the recent election. They claim they sent out campaign literature to parties in the city and it was returned marked "Not here," and at the polls these same people voted. A meeting was called Saturday night in the Rookery and 40 prominent lawyers pledged themselves to go to the polls May 7 and see that only good votes were cast. In the meantime the other matter will be looked into.
