MOLDERS' STRIKE Last Expedient to Drown Out Industrial Peace Association Of-Fire in the Molly Gibson fers to Aid in Arbitration. Property. FIRST ANNUAL MEETING CONCRETE USED AS IN CIRCUIT COURT ROOM A FIRE EXTINGUISHER

In an effort to prevent if possible the impending strike threatened by the Port-land ironmolders unless they are granted an eight-hour day, members of the com-mittee on arbitration of the Oregon branch of the National Industrial Peace The fate of the Homestake mine, at end, South Dakots, which is on fire in the 500-foot level, is a subject of lively conjecture among Oregon mining men.
