DOUBLE TRACK ON LINE TO OAKS

Oregon Water Company Working Laborers Night and Day in Rushing to Completion.

Gangs of laborers are working night and day on the O. W. P. line to complete the double tracks to the Oaks by May 10. Already the double tracks have been almost completed and the company is assured that the lines will be ready for operation by the specified date.

The new line parallels the old track on the east and when completed there will be double tracks to the Sellwood Mill station, a short distance beyond the Oaks. The new track, as does the single track, traverses the big marsh on the east bank of the river. A huge embankment is being laid alongside the embankment that was completed for the old track last year, so that both tracks will have solid ballast.

Enormous quantities of earth will be necessary to complete the fill through the marsh for the embankment. The dirt is being hauled from the high excavation on the north of the marsh. One steam engine train and three elec-
