WRITER TELLS HOW THE SHOW APPEARS TO HIM

Judge Takes Look at Owner, Then at Dog and Then Reaches for His Tickets-Fine Attendance at Fixture Last Night.

What is a dog show?
That's easy to the breeder of dogs, and even to the individual who has "been there" a time or two. But to
the many who have never yet passed
in at the gate, and who, by the way,
ought to pass in at once, a dog show
Is nothing but—just a dog show.

A dog show is, for one thing, an exhibition of dogs whose grandmas and
grandpas have not yet been lost in the
mists of obscurity. The pass are

mists of obscurity. The pets are "benched" in stalls, which are ranged in long rows with a little hay in the bottom to serve as a cushion. The members of the different classes are bunched together and the proper thing for the exhibits to do is to how! a great deal of the time. At least that's what they do.

Then there's the judging. Not every dog gets a prize, but a great many do, and if there happens to be only one dog in a class he is sure to get several How It Is Done.

The judging is done in a sawdust arena about the size of a prize ring. The judge stands in the center and the owners lead in their specimens. The judge takes a look at the owner—sometimes two looks, if she is a woman—then he takes a look at the dog and reaches for his tickets. Happy is the exhibitor who gets a blue ticket. There are only about 200 dogs in Portland's bench show this year, but because there are so many classes and sub-classes it takes about two days and a half of more or less hard labor to hand out all the tickets.

The dog show is useful-for the owner in that it tells him whether his dog is better than his neighbor's and stimulates him on to greater efforts toward the turning out of blue-blooded animals; for the public in that it affords the opportunity of learning, by means of a system of cataloguing, the names of the various breeds of animated sausage meat which carry their tails through the streets of Portland.

The attendance at the exposition building last night was quite large. Crowds of men, women and children passed back and forth in front of the stalls admiring the intelligent brutes and putting out a hand now and then to pat a beauty on the head. The crowds were thickest about the spaniels and the great St. Bernard. These were handled freely. Few dared to touch the S. Raymond. Home Valley, Wash.
