

JOIN RANKS OF GRANT-BUSTERS

Douglas County Has a Contingent Who Plan to Secure Harriman Holdings.

TO FORCE IF THEY CAN AND SUE IF THEY MUST

Cheered by Considerations of Justice of Their Cause, but Meanwhile Note of Skepticism is Heard—A Reflection on Roosevelt.

Roseburg, Or., May 18.—The agitation originating in the Willamette valley to force the Southern Pacific road to comply with the terms of the government grants, requiring it to sell lands at \$2.50 per acre, a price not exceeding \$2.50 per acre, has reached southern Oregon and many people in Douglas county are especially active.

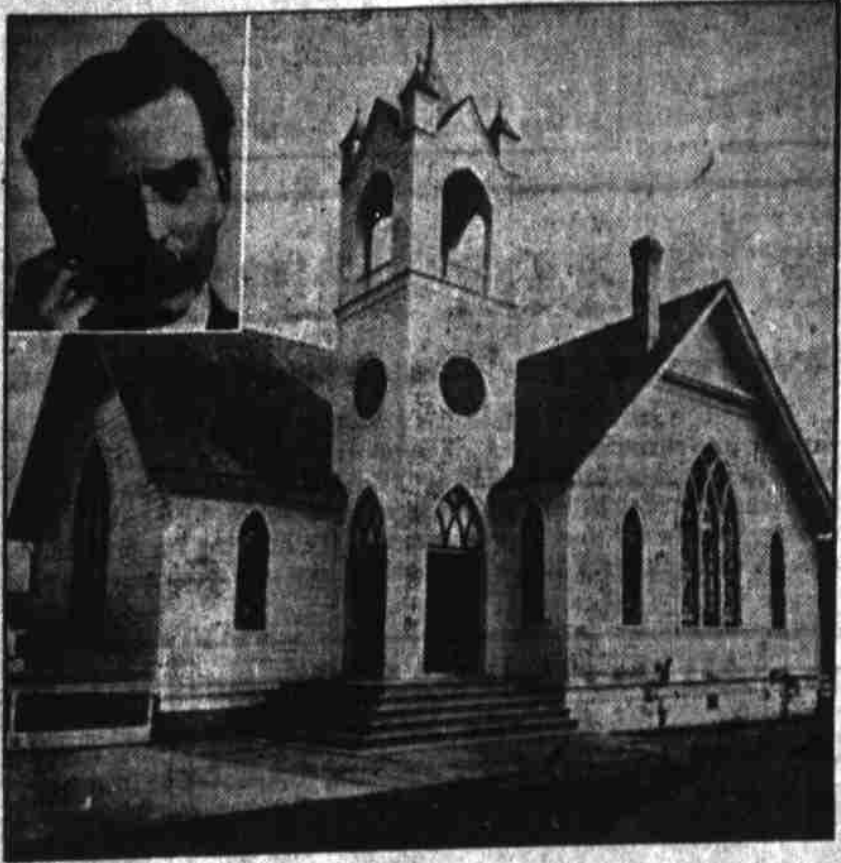
A large number of prospective purchasers, who will be actual settlers, have employed Fullerton and Orcutt, local attorneys, to look after their interests. They have selected lands in the Oregon & California railroad and Central Oregon railroad grants, now in possession of the Southern Pacific company, and the attorneys will go to San Francisco and tender the price of these lands to the company. In case the railroad declines to sell the lands at \$2.50 per acre, a suit will be brought to compel it to do so.

Considerations That Inspire.
Reports are constantly coming from Washington that the administration will take steps to compel the Southern Pacific to sell these lands according to the terms of the grant or forfeit them. Some authorities believe the lands have already been forfeited by the action of the road in selling them in violation of the terms of the grant. Some of the most conservative business men in Douglas county have entered into the pool to obtain these lands for settlement and believe the administration will force the railroad to come to terms.

The Voice of the Skeptic.
Others, who are perhaps better informed, are not at all sanguine of success. They freely say they do not believe that so long as Roosevelt is president, Mr. Harriman is compelled by the government to relinquish any of his fraudulently obtained wealth. They say the president may call Harriman an "undesirable citizen" for political effect, but when it comes to doing anything like carrying out the implied contract whereby Harriman contributed a quarter of a million to the Roosevelt campaign, the president will remain standing pat and will deliver the goods.

John W. Yerkes, former commissioner of internal revenue, has made it known that he will not accept the Republican nomination for governor of Kentucky. These now mentioned for the nomination are ex-governor William O. Bradley, Augustus E. Wilson of Louisville and E. T. Franks, collector of internal revenue of one of the districts.

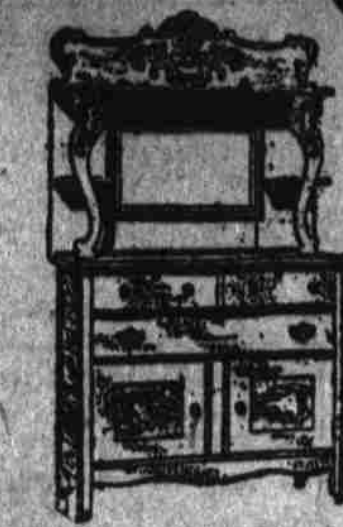

RAILWAY RULES OF WASHINGTON

State Commission Ordains in Accordance With Its Original Purposes.

SLIGHT CONCESSIONS TO CORPORATION PROTESTS

Interchangeable Mileage Book Rule Already in Effect—What Car Distribution Records Must Show—Synopsis of the Rules.

Olympia, Wash., May 18.—The railroad commission today issued the rules and regulations which have been under consideration for several weeks past, governing the transportation of passengers, record of car distribution, passenger depot requirements, bulletining of trains, and safety devices on the railroads within the state. The regulations become effective on June 10.

Several conferences have been held between the commission and railroad officials during the preparation of these regulations, and, while concessions were granted by the commission in some particulars wherein railroad passenger officials convinced the commissioners that certain proposed rules would work needless hardship, the rules as finally promulgated are substantially the same as originally drafted by the commission.

The rule requiring the issuance of interchangeable mileage books, which has been under discussion with the railroads for some time past, has already been put into effect and the books are now on sale.

Rule 10 requires the railroads to have the rules and regulations printed and a copy posted at each passenger depot in the state. It is probable, however, that the railroad commission itself will have these notices printed and sufficient copies supplied the railroads on application, for posting in their depots.

Synopsis of the Rules.

The rules and regulations are 11 in number, and provide in substance as follows:

Rule 1—Regular trip tickets at regular rates good for 30 days.
Rule 2—Same redeemable at any time in six months if not used.
Rule 3—Provides for issuance of interchangeable mileage books, 2,000 miles, at \$5.
Rule 4—Provides for redemption of and credits for and on mileage books.
Rule 5—Orders maintenance of comfortable and sanitary waiting-rooms and accessories, and specifies hours when they shall be open to the public.
Rule 6—Provides for bulletining of boards for recording train movements.
Rule 7—Specify what record of car distribution must show, and order it be kept accessible to all bona-fide shippers, these records to be kept by each station agent for his station and at each division superintendent's office for his division.
Rule 8—Relates to safety appliances.

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SISTERS AT PENDLETON INCORPORATE HOSPITAL

Training School for Nurses in Connection—Will Be Under Order of St. Francis.

Salem, Or., May 18.—Pendleton is to have a hospital. Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday with the secretary of state. The incorporators are Mother Mary Stanislaus, Sister Mary Bernadette and Sister Aquinas, all of Pendleton, and Sisters of the Order of St. Francis. It will be called St. Anthony's hospital and will be conducted according to the rules of the Order of St. Francis. It will maintain a training school for nurses and will have the right to confer diplomas. The association has a capital stock of \$55,000. Other incorporators were as follows: The New Era Drug company, incorporators E. T. Anderson, D. H. Jordan, Mary H. Jordan; main office Enterprise; capital stock \$2,500. The Hood River Oregon Industries company, incorporators C. M. T. O'Connell, A. L. Dundas, R. M. Dodson, H. C. Prudhomme, W. E. Stevenson; capital stock \$50,000; main office Portland. The Milton Hotel company, incorporators A. M. Egan, H. M. Cookburn, B. A. Miller, W. E. Putnam, A. E. Troen; main office Milton; capital stock \$12,500.
