An information charging Hans Holt with manslaughter was sworn to yesterday morning by Patrolman J. J. Anderson. Holt, who is an ex-member of the fire department, became engaged in a brawl with Henry Robinson in Fred Fritz's Burnside street saloon several days ago and knocked him down with a blow on the head. Robinson's head struck the tiled floor, fracturing his skull and causing death. Holt was charged by the coroner's jury with manslaughter and the information filed was merely in the nature of a formality.

Beyond setting his belief that the Oregon people will take a fair view of the statements relative to the fight being waged by the Linn county granges against the state university appropriation, and that the first statements covered the whole matter in controversy with absolute fairness to all, President F. L. Campbell, who was visiting in the city yesterday, said little of interest had developed lately. PROVIDE BOARD OF ENGINEERS

Act to Be Voted Upon in June Is Safeguard to Life of Public.

ENGINE MEN MUST PASS EXAMINATION

New Ordinance Would Provide for Commission of Three Mechanics to Examine Into Competency of Men Running Stationary Engines.

Considerable interest is manifest among the stationary engineers relative to the act regulating and licensing members of the craft which will be voted on at the June election. The measure is intended to provide Portland with a board of engineer examiners consisting of three mechanics who have been residents of the city for a period of not less than seven years and who have spent not less than 10 years at their calling.

Chief among the bodies favoring the passage of the act is the National Association of Stationary Engineers, a chapter of which is located in Portland. This organization maintains that the enactment will prevent loss of life and property due to incompetency in the handling of boilers and engines.

It is said that Portland is the only city of its size in the United States without such a board. Penalties are provided for unlicensed operators of stationary steam boilers in Portland, excepting those under the jurisdiction of the federal government and those where the pressure does not exceed 15 pounds to the square inch and the water returns to the boiler without the aid of a steam pump, injector or inspirator. Applicants must pass an examination to secure a license, which may be revoked for incompetency, incompetency or neglect. Applicants must deposit the sum of \$5 with the city treasurer and if successful will receive a license without additional charge for the first year. Every year thereafter the licensee must pay into the city treasurer \$1. This is designed to make the examining board self-supporting.

Violation of the ordinance is punishable by a fine of not more than \$250 or imprisonment not to exceed 90 days.

RATES MADE FOR TEACHERS

Fare and Third for Round Trip Granted for Salem Convention.

The executive committee of the State Teachers' association, which meets at Salem, July 1-3, has completed arrangements with the Southern Pacific and O. R. & N. lines in Oregon for a rate of one and one-third fare. That is, full fare going and one-third fare returning, provided the teacher has a certificate when she purchases the ticket.

Hotels Make Rates. The hotels and rooming houses have made special rates also. The Willamette hotel asks \$2 per day for board and room for single person. For more than one person in a room, \$1.10 per day. Other boarding houses, 50 cents per day for room and 25 cents a meal. The same rates apply to rooms in private families. Deductions from these rates will be made for large delegations. Marion, Polk, and Linn counties and the county superintendent's convention will be in the hands of the printer by June 1.
