SPEND OVER \$100,000 TO IMPROVE SUBURB

Over Six Hundred Lots Sold in Rose City Park Since February.

Over 600 lots have been sold in Rose City Park since February 15, ranging in value from \$400 to \$1,100, with a total value of about \$200,000. The owners of the addition have expended \$25,000 in building the electric line, \$15,000 in putting in Bull Run water and within the year will have expended \$60,000 on street and sidewalk improvement.

Electric cars will begin running regularly to the park by the last of next week. The permanent crossing of the O. R. & N. is completed and will be put in Monday. The track will be ballasted as fast as three work trains can do it.

DEDICATE EPISCOPAL CHURCH AT GRESHAM

President Coleman of Willamette University Delivers Sermon at Linnemann Memorial.

Dedication of the new Methodist Episcopal church at Gresham occupied the most of the day yesterday. The new edifice is an attractive building and is the culmination of the efforts of Rev. Alfred Thompson, pastor, who has been untiring in his devotion to the work of accomplishing its completion.

Dr. J. H. Coleman, president of Willamette university, delivered the sermon at the morning service. Rev. John Flinn, Rev. J. H. Wood and Rev. David Wolfe assisted. Rev. John Flinn delivered the afternoon sermon and in the evening Rev. J. W. McDougall of Albany spoke. Rev. B. F. Rowland, Rev. A. D. Wagner, Rev. L. D. Driver, and Rev. A. C. Nutley assisted in the services.

The church is called the Linnemann Memorial church in honor of Mrs. E. Linnemann and in memory of her husband. Mrs. Linnemann was the largest contributor. Gresham people subscribed \$4,600 toward the erection of the church.

There are a number of art windows. There are memorial windows in honor of Father Cully and in memory of Mrs. Florence Cleveland. Rev. L. D. Driver will commence a series of lectures and sermons in the new church tonight.

DIVIDE CITY INTO DISTRICTS FOR FOURTH

General Committee Tonight Will Lay the First Plans for the Celebration.

The "Fourth of July" general committee will meet tonight in the council chamber at the city hall. General O. Summers has signified his intention of accepting the chairmanship of the committee having the celebration in charge.

The principal business that will come before tonight's meeting will be the division of the city into districts and the appointment of sub-committees to solicit funds in each district. It is probable that citizens outside of the general committee will be called upon to serve on these sub-committees.

It is generally agreed that no further effort will be made to have the rose carnival and the Fourth combined. The indications are that the roses will be at their best 10 or 15 days prior to July 4.

SECURES CHURCH AND SITE IN SIX MONTHS

Dedication of Estacada Methodist Edifice Next Month Will Mark Record.

The new Methodist Episcopal church at Estacada is nearing completion and will be dedicated June 2. Rev. Clarence True Wilson, of Grace church, will preach the dedicatory sermon. The cost of the edifice, when completed, will be about \$5,000. Rev. C. T. McPherson, the pastor, has already raised \$2,200 and expects to have the remaining \$2,800 in hand by the time the building is completed.

The O. W. E. Townsley company gave the congregation five beautiful lots as a site for the church and parsonage. It is the highest point in Estacada townsite survey and commands a fine view of the surrounding country.

As soon as the church is finished, work will begin at once on a parsonage to cost \$2,500.

Rev. C. T. McPherson was sent to Estacada last October by the Methodist conference and found neither church nor parsonage. Since that time he has succeeded in getting together a church property worth about \$10,000.

CAPTURED ELK KILLER SWALLOWS STRYCHNINE

Helena, Mont., May 20.—Rather than submit to arrest on a charge of killing elk out of season Peter Paulsen committed suicide while being taken to the county seat by officers, according to a report made to State Game Warden Scott today by Deputy Ferguson. Paulsen and his brother had made threats that they would not be taken alive, and officers resorted to strategy to make the arrest. They succeeded in gaining entrance to the Paulsen house and held them up at revolver's points. They started for the county seat and during the trip were compelled to stay over night. Ferguson slept with his prisoner, who during the night swallowed a dose of strychnine and was found dead in the morning. Paulsen was about 25 and recently came from North Dakota.

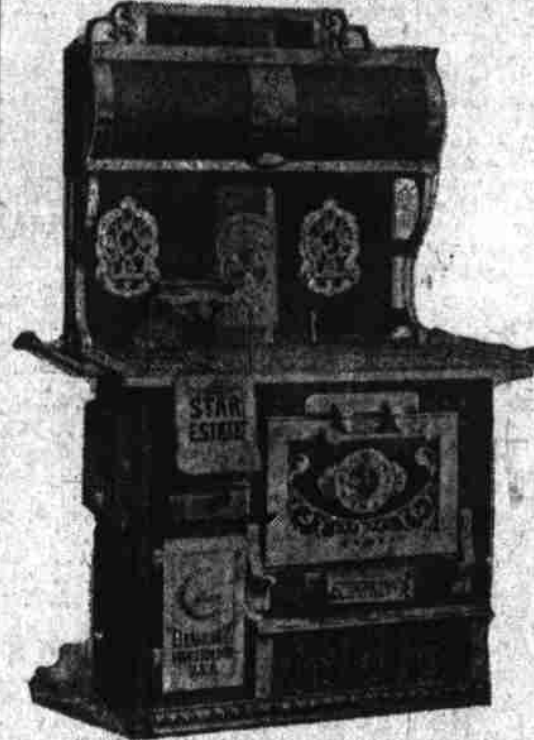
