DIVIDE CITY INTO DISTRICTS FOR FOURTH

General Committee Tonight Will Lay the First Plans for the Celebration.

The "Fourth of July" general com-mittee will meet tonight in the council chamber at the city hall. General O. Summers has signified his intention of accepting the chairmanship of the com-mittee having the celebration in charge.

The principal business that will come before tonight's meeting will be the division of the city into districts and the appointment of sub-committees to solicit funds in each district. 
