PICNICKING AS THEY IMPROVE

Rogue River Fruitgrowers Will Combine the Festal With the Commercial.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal)
Grants Pass, Or., May 20.—A well attended meeting of fruit growers was held in this city Saturday under the auspices of the Grants Pass Fruit Growers' union. It was in the nature of an experience meeting. Much interest was manifested and the discussion brought out many valuable points. It was decided to hold a meeting in the Lee district, five miles west of this city, on Saturday, June 22. This will be a picnic affair and will be held in a handsome oak grove on the banks of Rogue river. A basket dinner will be served and the day will be made a social affair as well as a meeting to discuss orchard problems. In this district are some of the largest and finest orchards in Josephine county and attend the close of the regular program for the meeting the fruit growers will visit these orchards and study the method of cultivating, pruning and thinning practiced by the owners.
It is the plan of the Fruit Growers' union to hold public meetings hereafter at least once in two months to better keep on the campaign of education in raising the standard of fruit growing in

Josephine county. The union will hold its annual election of officers here on Saturday, June 1. The present officers are R. A. N. Reymers, president; R. M. Robinson, vice president; Charles M. Merve, secretary and manager; L. J. Jewell, treasurer; directors, R. A. N. Reymers, R. M. Robinson, J. H. Robinson, J. T. Morrison, E. Erickson, C. F. Lovelace, H. C. Bobstien, J. H. Colby and S. C. Christie. The union was organized last year and though starting with but few members made such a success of marketing fruit that almost every fruit raiser in the county has asked to become a member.

Little Harm Done by Frosts.

But very little injury was done by the frost the first of this month, which was so general over the north Pacific coast, in the orchards of Rogue river valley. Only a few low-lying orchards were frosted and these will have more than half a crop. Owing to the thorough spraying in Josephine county the past winter and this spring there will be a larger amount of first class apples and pears this year than last. The growers are expecting big prices owing to the tremendous havoc made by pests in the orchards of the east and by the killing of the fruit buds by heavy late frosts that were experienced all over the east and south. The yield of peaches and grapes here will be up to the average average.
