It wishes to reduce its coal car mileage to a minimum and to have the cars free for service when there is the greatest demand for them, so that it will have no difficulty in meeting commer-

have no difficulty in meeting commercial needs when they arise. The plan adopted involves an expenditure of more than \$300,000, but the road expects to save more by its adoption ultimately. It is also trying to impress on coal dealers in the territory named the desirability of laying in their supplies earlier, so that when the winter's rush of traffic comes all danger of coal famine will be averted. In order to encourage them to adopt this policy, it has reage them to adopt this policy, it has re-duced rates on coal for the summer months, and prices at the mines have been cut to the minimum.
