The preliminary hearing of George W. Bever was continued yesterday afternoon until Tuesday morning by United States Commissioner J. A. Sladen. James H. Parks, deputy federal mineral inspector at Goldfield, was on the stand yesterday and said the mining company of which Bever is manager and vice-president possesses only a prospect and not a mine. Parks testified that he would not give 18 cents a share for stock in Bever's company. He said that instead of being in the heart of the Goldfield district the company's property is four miles away.

DEVLIN DODGES ISSUES RAISED BY MONTAGUE

Candidate Rambles All Around Question of Campaign Funds. But Does Not Answer.

Fireworks broke forth at a Republican rally which was held on Thurman street, near Twenty-third street, last night, when Thomas C. Devlin departed from the arena under the circumstances in which his discussion of campaign funds, and his denunciation of the charges which had been made against him, relative to the manner in which he secured revenue for conducting his campaign.

Mr. Devlin, however, did not offer to make a statement in answer to Mr. Montague's question, whether or not he was willing to publish an account of his expenses at the primary in the present campaign. He dodged the issue by saying that if it was asked of him, the same accounting should be demanded of other candidates.

Mr. Devlin denied receiving money from public utility or any other corporation, he did not attempt to answer any of the other questions asked by Mr. Montague. Instead, he proceeded to discuss civic improvements and some of the proposed charter amendments.
