SAFE IN PORT

Lillebonne Arrives at Astoria  
After a Long Voyage  
From Manila.

COMES TO REAP HARVEST  
IN COAST LUMBER TRADE

Conditions Have Changed Materially  
Since Vessel Left the Islands and  
Owners Will Have to Be Content  
With Ordinary Profits.

Hardly had the local waterfront fraternity begun to display a little anxiety for the safety of the diminutive sailing schooner Lillebonne before she made her appearance off the mouth of the river. She crossed in yesterday afternoon and is now at anchor in the bay off Astoria awaiting instructions.

The Lillebonne made the long run from Manila in 73 days, which is about 20 days longer than the average sailing time, but by no means an unusually long voyage. Calms and head winds held her back, but now and then some fine spurts were made when the wind was just right and from the right quarter.

The Lillebonne has been engaged in the Philippine coast trade for some time, but was started back for the states in order to get in on the rich harvest reaped by the lumber droghers. Unfortunately for the owner of the Lillebonne lumber freights have decreased about \$4 per 1,000 since the craft towed out of Manila harbor, and even at the reduced rate some vessels may have to go begging for cargoes. Conditions here are slightly worse than during the past 80 days, and chiefly because of the serious labor troubles in California. The strikes have put a stop to building operations in San Francisco and other coast cities and the demand for lumber has practically dwindled to nothing.

Railroad tie shipments have kept a number of vessels going since the slump in the California demand for building lumber, but it is said on good authority that the bulk of the ties needed for the near future has been moved, so that there will be few cargoes of that mill product sent south for some time.

Owners of bottoms, however, feel that market conditions will soon improve again since under fair conditions there is an actual demand for lumber throughout California. The outcome is awaited with the deepest of interest because upon it will depend the value of the floating properties. Steam schooner stocks have risen slightly during the past year with practically none for sale, but the unexpected change will make itself felt should the downward movement in freights continue.

REASONS ARE PRESENTED  
Puget Sound Will Not Get All Aids  
to Navigation.

(Journal Special Service.)  
Olympia, May 25.—The secretary of the department of commerce and labor, Hon. Oscar Strauss, has sent a detailed response to senate joint memorial No. 2, passed by the last legislature calling upon the department of commerce and labor for the construction of numerous additional lighthouses, fog horns, fog bells, buoy lights, fog lights and light ships for the waters of Puget Sound and adjacent waters.  
The legislative memorial referred to, called for a lighthouse at Jefferson head, lighthouse and fog horn at Lip Lip Point, fog bell and buoy light at Point Hudson, light ship and fog horn at Point Partridge, light ship and fog horn near time works on San Juan island, light and fog horn at Vito Vito rocks, light ship at Helm Bank (Straits of San Juan), light at Clark point, flashing light in place of the present red light at Patos Island, and for the removal of the light at Admiralty Head.

Secretary Strauss presents arguments against most of the recommendations offered by the legislature in its memorial. He says further consideration will be given the recommendation for a light on San Juan island, for the change of light at Patos island and for the discontinuance of the light at Admiralty Head. In the other cases, reasons are presented for not giving the requests favorable consideration at this time.  
The letter from Secretary Strauss is addressed to the secretary of the senate, J. W. Lysons, by whom the memorial was forwarded by order of the legislature.
