As the government considers this point of such vital consequence as to spend vast sums of money merely to have the meat for the consumer properly inspected, certainly the very least that thinking people can do is to order from their dealers government-inspected meat. This one act of precaution would do more to insure the general health of the community than any other thing, and it requires only a little forethought.
